



Play fair and pay your fare

Fare evasion on Victoria's public transport is at a five year low to less than nine per cent.

Premier Denis Napthine said Public Transport Victoria (PTV) had worked with transport operators to target fare evaders at known hotspots.

"The October 2013 survey shows a drop in fare evasion rates across all metropolitan modes of public transport.

"But, the fare evasion rate is still too high, and passengers who travel with a valid ticket expect other passengers to pay their way," Dr Napthine said.

The Redesdale Reserve Committee has joined the Redesdale and District Association as a 'ordinary member'.

The reserve committee has been working on several projects over the past year.

Led by Ivan Huston, our Chairman, the extension to the pavilion is almost complete.

The extra undercover area is designed to be used not only for sporting events, but has also been designed to house stalls and displays on open days, and market days.

Ivan and his two lads put countless hours into the build, and a group of Committee members completed the tidy up in conjunction with a working bee on the grounds.

We recently applied to the council for a grant to establish inground seating and a second picnic table near the

oval and rotunda.

We were awarded a \$3000 grant which will neatly cover the cost of equipment, and perhaps a little left over for general maintenance.

On the issue of maintenance, it is certainly an ongoing task, and thanks to the generosity of many community members it is often done without incurring cost.

In the last year we have held three working bees in which general tidying, pruning and planting were the main focus.

In future we will advertise upcoming Recreation Reserve working bees in the window of the General Store, and welcome all those who wish to turn up and help out.

A few months ago, the Redesdale Reserve Committee formally leased the Redsdale Hall to the Redesdale Hall Committee and its tireless members.

This enabled the hall committee to take out personal indemnity insurance to cover those working at the hall during functions.

Our community is lucky to have such a dedicated group looking after the hall and its guests.

The hall remains within the Recreation Reserve Committee's bailiwick, but the lease provides some welcomed autonomy for the committee. The Recreation Reserve Committee pays a 'peppercorn' lease of \$101 a year on a five year plus five year basis. As the landlord, the Recreation Reserve Committee will need to approve all capital works undertaken on the hall, but will ensure that we are very

supportive of the needs and wishes of the hall committee, and wherever possible will help with such works.

At the last committee meeting, we were briefed by Kathy Hall from the Redesdale and District Association (RaDA) on its activities, and a unanimous decision was taken by our committee to join RaDA as an 'ordinary member'.

Members of RaDA have already made excellent use of the hall and reserve, and we look forward to building a strong relationship between the two committees for the betterment of our community. The committee donated \$250 towards the defibrillator, be-ing installed at the school, and has also taken out public liability insurance and accident insurance to cover those participating in activities on the Reserve.

There were widows from the Anglican, Uniting, Catholic and Revival Churches with tales to tell of the early days in Heathcote when they wouldn't have been seen dead talking with each other much less sharing a chicken parmigiana.

What good company they were too.

There was Annie in her flowing light silky skirt with a blue top just picking up the blue flower in the skirt. "Both from Buddies and the Ambos Op Shops of Heathcote," she said with delight.

Widows of Australia unite! Henry Lawson had great stories to tell of nineteenth century Australia.

"Mrs Myers settled herself to enjoy life comfortably and happily at the fixed age of 39 for the next seven years or so. She was a pleasant faced dumpling, who had been baked solid in the droughts of Out Back without losing her good looks and had put up with a hard life." the possibility of starting a 'Progress Association'.

The meeting was attended by 21 local residents, the then Mayor Cr Alec Sandner, Joy Mason from the City of Greater Bendigo, (COGB) who chaired the meeting, and council candidate Wayne McRae.

Overwhelming support was received and one dissenting voice. Ten people volunteered to be on the committee of a new group.

The dissenting voice made the very good point that such groups had been formed enthusiastically before but had come to nothing.

It was therefore decided that with the formation of this new community group a review of its progress should be made after 12 months.

If no progress had been made, the group should be disbanded.

At this first meeting, it was decided it should be a wellstructured and formalised group and the stated aims were to facilitate the progression of the community plan; coordinate representatives from existing groups and committees; act as a central point of contact for residents, local government and other groups wishing to communicate with Redesdale residents, and act as a vehicle for communication with the community and share knowledge.

Following this first meeting, a committee was put together and met for the first time on Wednesday 23 October at the Redesdale - Mia Mia Primary School.

The School was offered as a meeting place purposely as it

was thought the needs of young people in the community needed to be high on the agenda of community development.

The meeting was chaired by Lyn Talbot from the Community Planning Department of the COGB.

The new group met on the third Thursday of every month since the first meeting.

It has undergone two name changes before deciding on 'Redesdale and District Association'. (The Association). On Tuesday 19 March 2013, the Association became incorporated and adopted the 'Model Rules' of Consumer Affairs Victoria.

Initial aims stated above were formalised for the process of incorporation and are now to develop, facilitate and review the Redesdale Community Plan: to act as a central point of contact for residents, local government and other groups wishing to contact Redesdale residents; to provide a common communication point for representatives of existing groups and committees; to develop and maintain a community website, and to encourage community cohesion through activities and improvement of facilities.

The rest of this document will review the progress of the Association according to the above criteria.

To develop, facilitate and review the Redesdale Community Plan.

Two public meetings were held to involve as many Redesdale residents as possible in the review of the community plan. The first was held on Sunday 3 February 2013 and was attended by approximately 60 residents who enjoyed a great meal after the work was done.

As many ideas as possible were sought and these were condensed down for the next meeting on Monday 28 April 2013.

A progress report was sent to the community through email, postal service for those without email, and through notices at the General Store, the hotel, and the public notice board.

At the April meeting, afternoon 'Devonshire' tea was enjoyed while residents voted for the ideas that they thought were most important.

Approximately 40 people attended.

Again the wider community was kept informed of the results through the means outlined above.

Following this meeting a draft community plan review was developed and circulated.

The progress of this review was discussed at the monthly meetings of the Association. During these months a grant of \$3600 was sought and obtained from the COGB for the costs of developing and launching the community plan, and developing the website.

The council, in the form of Lyn Talbot, Cr Helen Leach, and Joy Mason were very helpful and supportive during this process.

Finally the review was revised and put together with the help of the Bendigo council and the final version launched at a celebration of

council and the final version launched at a celebration of all the hard work and community participation at the Redesdale Hall on Sunday 8 September 2013.

The plan was launched by Bendigo Mayor Lisa Ruffell and was distributed the same week to all Redesdale residents.

Therefore, in terms of achieving the first of the stated aims of the Association, this goal was fulfilled within 12 months of the Association's development.

To act as a central point of contact for residents, local government and other groups wishing to contact Redesdale residents and provide a common communication point for representatives of existing groups and committees.

Since inception of the Association, the COGB has used the group as the main point of contact for dissemination of information.

Community information received by email from the council is sent to those who have email addresses and who have given these addresses to the Association.

There are 45 names on this contact list.

There are 16 households receiving information through the postal service.

Examples of contacts received by the Association

Make the battle easier for our fire crews this summer. Clear fire hazards are a person doing research with regard to possibly buying real estate in the area; a person doing historical research in the area; Landcare group wishing to be associated with the group to promote local landcare; people expressing interest in becoming part of the action groups for furthering the community plan; continual interaction with the Mia Mia group; input from most relevant Redesdale community groups through representation on the committee.

We have received an average of 15 email communications a month from groups.

The overwhelming feedback to the association has been positive and supportive.

To date 56 individuals have joined the Association as general members and have paid the \$20 joining fee.

It can therefore be said that, apart from some very isolated negativity, this goal has been met and there is still some work to be done to include more residents.

Develop and maintain a community website

The community website www.redesdale.net has been developed along with a community logo.

This was developed with the aid of the grant referred to above.

The website was launched with a demonstration at the event held on Sunday 8 September 2013.

Feedback was positive.

People are starting to use the site to track local events.

The website proved invaluable at the Discover Redesdale Festival held on the weekend of 1, 2, and 3 November 2013 as the festival brochure was available

on the website and several festival visitors had used it. Some festival goers discovered the events through running a Google search for Redesdale.

Local businesses are beginning to contact the website for inclusion.

Management of the website has now been handed to a Redesdale resident who is not on the Association committee and guidelines are being developed.

In terms of achieving the aims of the Association, this goal has been achieved within 12 months.

Encourage community cohesion through activities and improvement of facilities.

Most activities organised by the Association have been to do with development of the plan. However, three other major events have been achieved.

Firstly, the inaugural 'Two Rivers Cup' cricket match between the Coliban Colts and the Campaspe Crows was held in March 2013.

It was a great success and was well attended.

A positive side effect of the organisation of the event was the laying down of mod grass turf at the wicket on the reserve. The concrete wicket was unusable before.

This was achieved through Association funds with assistance from the COGB.

The second major event was production of the Kyneton Theatre Company's 'The Gondoliers (Gilbert and Sullivan), presented at the Rede-

"My project originated in the Self Expression and Leadership Program at Landmark Worldwide.

"It is a program where people take on projects in communities important to them.

"Innisfree, as a result of this auction, will start a trust fund for women who need financial support to access their treatment," April said.

She said work by artists, from 'dabblers' to 'career artists' would be auctioned.

"Post Natal Depression is a community concern.

"The Australian Post and Antenatal Depression Association (PANDA) reports one in seven women suffer from post natal depression." she said.

Beating the baby blues and more

One mother described her experience after working through post natal depression (PND) and finding help.

But what of those who cannot cope, even with believing there is a way, or seeking a pathway through.

She said her story about suffering from PND was a common one.

"After the birth of my first child in 2008 I suffered severe PND. It showed as inexplicable rage and resentment. I woke each day just wanting to 'run away from life.'

I couldn't do simple things such as answer the phone, a knock at the door, or go through the checkout at the supermarket.

My husband dreaded coming home and felt guilty going to work each day.

For treatment I was offered anti-depressants to help get through each day, but at best, I was told this would give me a 'numb' day, not a happy one.

Things got to a point after my second child, that I knew I had to find a way through, and provide my kids with a mother who could take real care of them and their needs. And enjoy being with them.

By a stroke of luck I found Innisfree on the Internet. Practitioners there provide holistic treatment using a range of disciplines including Chinese medicine, meditation, naturopathy, and many more.

sdale Hall on Sunday 5 May 2013, which was spectacular although not well attended. A lot was learnt about future marketing of such wonderful events. The third was a major event, the Discover Redesdale Festival which included an Art Show (run by the Hall committee and not the Association), open gardens, open studios, wine tastings, school art show, and photo exhibition as well as participation by the Campaspe Landcare Group. A second cricket match was played on the Sunday accompanied by a barbecue and this was again well received. The Rural Café (which has been closed and for sale for a long time) was opened for

the event and did a roaring trade. The festival was a great success and there are calls from many for it to be repeated. We are very grateful for their support. It is estimated that more than 100 local residents were involved in putting this festival together, and for this reason alone must be thought of as a great success.

Again, the goal has been met through a huge amount of energy and enthusiasm spent over the last year.

In summary, The Redesdale and District Association has achieved its aims.

The Committee is cohesive and meetings are well run, professional, and targeted to the welfare and positive development of the community. Smokes out at rail and tram waiting areas

Railway stations and raised platform tram stops will be smoke free from Saturday 1 March 2014.

Public Transport Minister Terry Mulder said new arrangements would extend existing smoke free zones, which only included covered areas of railway platforms and inside covered tram and bus shelters.

"Extending smoke free areas is good news for public transport passengers and supports other government initiatives aiming to reduce the impact of tobacco and second hand smoke on the community.

"Around 4000 lives are lost each year in Victoria as a result of smoking," he said. It costs \$2.4 billion in direct health costs and lost productivity every year," he said. Fines for smoking can be issued by Authorised Officers, Protective Services Officers, and police.

Signs and information at stations will help to raise public awareness of the extended smoke free areas.

From Tuesday 1 April 2014, Tobacco Act amendments will also ban smoking at outdoor children's playground equipment, skate parks, public swimming pool complexes, and sporting venues, during organised underage sporting events.

Grants for remote communities

The Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) will make charitable grants available to community groups working to help people in remote communities.

Applications close on Friday 28 March.

This grant program offers up to \$400,000 for regional and remote communities, made in amounts up to \$5000.

The program is broad and based on charitable groups, but cannot fund operational and administration costs, travel or accommodation.

Applications from communities with a population of 10,000 or less will receive priority.



The poppies of Flanders Fields

Between 2014 and 2018 Australia will commemorate the Anzac Centenary, marking 100 years since Australia's involvement in the First World War. In 2015, there will be a large number of activities commemorating 100 years since the Anzac Gallipoli landing. From its association with poppies flowering in the spring of 1915 on the battlefields of Belgium, France and Gallipoli, the poppy has become a symbol of both great loss in war and hope for those left behind. As part of the 2015 Anzac Commemoration, the 5000 Poppies Project will plant a field of more than 5000 poppies in Federation Square Melbourne as a stunning visual tribute to Australian servicemen and women.

Efforts to immunise all children

The Victorian Government has set a new target to have 95 per cent of children fully immunised before they start school.

Health Minister David Davis said more needed to be done to protect children from preventable diseases.

"We are striving to lift the immunisation coverage to 95 per cent in 2015.

"Starting school means children are in contact with a larger number of people, which can expose them to a range of potentially dangerous diseases, so ensuring they are fully immunised is the best protection we can give them."

Education Minister Martin Dixon said starting school was an ideal time for immunisation status to be checked and to deal with any that have been missed. role to play in supporting tobacco control and reducing harm associated with smoking," he said.

More than 90 per cent of patients at Alfred Health already have their smoking identified, nicotine dependency assessed, and are offered support soon after admission.

Ballarat Health Services, Bendigo Health, Goulburn Valley Health, Northeast Health Wangaratta, Kyabram District Health Service, Southwest Healthcare and Western Health will pilot this program.

The pilot project is supported by Quit Victoria, the Australian Medical Assoc-

iation, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners and the Victorian Network of Smoke free Healthcare Services.

Mr Davis said health professionals were well placed to make a significant difference in reducing tobacco use be-cause they were seen as credible sources of health information.

He said there was evidence of only a few minutes advice from health professionals being highly effective in motivating people to quit smoking. He said the quit rate was improved further by the provision of cessation therapies.
