The camp was located mainly at Melbourne University, where we completed a number of engineering activities. Some activities were located at

the RMIT city campus, Monash University and the La Trobe Bundoora campus.

The camp was six days in total and we stayed at Queens College, which is one of the many colleges at Melbourne University. The camp leaders were current

university students from a variety of universities, studying an array of subjects.

Some of the engineering activities included egg drop, Lego robots, Laser Tag (we had to solder components to a PCB), bridge building, water filtration and more. All the activities were a lot of fun and were aimed at developing teamwork, communication and problem solving skills. All while giving us a taste of different varieties of engineering, including civil, electronic, aerospace, software, mechanical, mechatronic, chemical, automotive and more.

Along with the engineering activities, we had a lot of guest speaker's talk about a variety of university and engineering topics. Many speakers were either engineering students or employed engineers. They spoke mostly about what they do day-to-day, how they got to the job they are in now and what inspired them to pick engineering as a career. We were also given many opportunities to ask the speakers any questions. Other guest speakers included entrepreneurs and engineers from the defence force.

Throughout much of the camp, the leaders spoke to us a lot about university life, and how they are getting through it. These discussions involved topics such as housing/accommodation, budgeting, part-time work, work experience, résumés, application letters and time management.

This camp was a lot of fun, I made new friends and it has taught me a lot about university and engineering. Before the camp, I was completely unsure about university. But now, I am a lot more confident and look forward to doing either software or electronic engineering in university.

I highly recommend this camp to students in years 10, 11 and 12, who are interested in engineering, but are unsure whether university is right for them.

Bird Walk along the Campaspe River 19.10.15

You are invited to participate in a Bird Walk on private property at Glenhope on the Campaspe River on Monday 19th October from 9 am to about 1 pm.

Everyone is welcome, from experienced birdwatchers to complete beginners. The only restriction is that the walk down to the river is about two kilometres of occasionally rocky and steep terrain: participants will need to be moderately fit and agile. Stout shoes are a must and clothing according to the weather is advised.

The Walk will be led by two experienced local birdwatchers: Cathy Newing and Mark Buckby from Woodend Bird Observers Club. During the Walk, all birds seen or heard will be recorded and the resultant list will be submitted for inclusion in the 2015 Aussie Backyard Bird Count.

The assembly point for the walk is on Sievers Lane, off Watchbox Road, Glenhope. At the end of the walk, brunch will be served.

The event is free and has been funded by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal and is also supported by the Caring for the Campaspe project funded by the Victorian Government and delivered by the North Central Catchment Management Authority.







Redesdale Recreation Reserve Committee of Management Inc. Chairman's Monthly Report September-2015

Hi Redesdalians,

This last month has been filled with exciting news with several projects happening to enhance the reserve and its surroundings. Firstly the fence along Reserve Lane is now being totally renewed to the second gate.

The reserve irrigation storage tank has been resited with a proper retaining edge to allow the installation of a second storage tank to supply fresh drinking water for users of the reserve. Installation will occur on the 25th September and the gutter on the south side of the pavilion will be realigned to farm the fresh drinking water. The committee thanks Barfold Quarry for donating another load of material.

Plans are under way to fit new front gates to the entrance off Redesdale-Kyneton Rd which will allow pedestrians safe access to the hall and reserve during events, hopefully installed in time for the Redesdale Rocks Festival and art show.

CoGB will be installing new bollards around the septic distribution field to replace the treated pine posts by the end of the month. It is very heartening to see the council is prepared to assist the committee when the committee is eager and committed to getting the job done.

CoGB has granted a planning permit to proceed with stage 1 of the pavilion project, architect Terry Mitton has agreed to produce construction drawings and assist with applying for a building permit.

Many thanks goes to Barbara. Campbell. for the fantastic job she did, but unfortunately she has had to resign from cleaning the public toilets as she has had to relocate from the hotel. The committee wishes Barbara all the best for the future. A new contractor has been appointed and will carry on without any disruption. The committee is working towards making the reserve a show place of our little town for the community and visitors to enjoy. We look forward to what we can achieve in the time to the run-up to the festival.

In an emergency remember "DRS - ABCD"

- D-Danger (To yourself and by-standers)
- R-Response (Response of the patient)
- S-Send for help (TLC)
- A-Airway (Open/check patient airway)
- B-Breathing (Is the patient breathing normally)
- C-CPR (30 compressions 2 breaths)
- D-De-fib (Attach a de-fib as soon as possible and follow the prompts)

Continue CPR until responsiveness or normal breathing returns.

A De-fib (AED) unit is available from the Redesdale General Store 24 hours a day 7 days a week. (The AED is kept inside the front door on the left). (ph 5425 3154)

An understanding/completion of a basic first aid course will greatly help with a medical emergency.



REDESDALE AND DISTRICT ASSOCIATION AGM

On the evening of Thursday August 20th, at 6.30pm, the third AGM of the Redesdale and District Association (the Association) was held at the Redesdale Hall. As president of the Association, Jo Smith-Sargent chaired the evening's proceedings. Twenty-four people attended and there were apologies from 12 members. A special welcome went to Cr. Helen Leach (CoGB) who has been tireless in her support of the local community. Jo reinforced that the main objective of the Association is to implement the Community Plan reviewed in 2013. She said, "Several of the Community Plan goals fall under the charge of the Feasibility Study which was recently commissioned by the City of Greater Bendigo. The goals set in the Community Plan would probably not be able to be reached if we did not secure financial support from various sources. The Feasibility Study has assessed whether these goals are worthwhile. The draft report has been produced and it is favourable to the Community Plan goals but it has not yet been made officially public. We are excited at the prospect of moving ahead with these projects."

Glenn Brown, Captain of the Redesdale CFA stated that a highlight of this year was the purchase of a new fire truck which has attended fires in Kilmore, Bendigo and Tylden as well as many more local fires. Redesdale CFA attended 48 fires this year, some of which were very large. One fire was attended by 43 trucks. Glenn then talked about the importance of Redesdale as a staging area. He said that the main assets used are the fire shed, the hall (for food and refreshment), and the reserve. The reserve is occasionally used for helicopter landings and often for fire trucks. He said the work and efficiency of the CFA would be enhanced if the pavilion on the oval was developed as per the 'lock-up' plan submitted to council as there was a need for a briefing and debriefing area away from the eating area. The pavilion - right next to the oval – is ideally placed. The CFA has written a letter of support to the CoGB for the endeavours of the Reserve Committee to complete this task. Members of the Reserve Committee were able to advise Glenn the planning permit had been received in the previous 48 hours and now the building permit will be sought. He regretted there had been a delay in granting the planning permit as it is hoped the facility will be completed before this next

Jo then spoke about two other focal points of this year's achievements. Firstly, the new path from the school to the store and the school bus turning circle which is due to be completed at the end of August. She acknowledged the continual drive of members of the Association and of Councillors Leach and Campbell in securing this important improvement to conditions outside the school. "Secondly, the naming of the bridge has also been a significant success over the past year. A further endeavour has been to look at the feasibility of a walking or bike trail joining Redesdale with other trails and towns. A subcommittee of the Association headed by Heather Carmody, has been addressing this and a document outlining the concept has gone to the planning department of the COGB.

Another goal set out in the Community Plan was to "support existing and develop new community events". So far this year we have successfully organised and delivered a fabulous Cricket Day and two Dinner+Talk Evenings. All have brought the community together and all have raised funds to directly benefit our community.

The first of the Dinner+Talks was held in November last year. A member of the project management team from the new Bendigo Hospital delivered a pre-showing of their new build. The second Dinner+Talk was held last month and was delivered by the Otis Foundation. They wished to use the evening to introduce Kez's Hideaway to the community. Kez's Hideaway will become a special retreat for women recovering from and living with breast cancer. The home is being constructed by Paul Gray, a Bendigo Builder in memory of his late wife, Kerri (also known as Kez). Paul, together with many volunteers and the OTIS foundation are building this retreat in their own time, with donations from many supporters. A visit to this retreat will be free for anyone suffering from breast cancer.

This "Dinner + Talk" evening was purely to welcome this project into the community and to introduce this project to the many community members who have driven by and wondered "who is building that big house on Racecourse Road?" This project is special because it has been made possible by some of our local people. This house is being built on land donated through the generosity of the Campbell family in Redesdale. We originally set out for this to be an information evening only but the Association decided to donate funds raised on the night to the Otis Foundation. This was a very pleasant surprise for the Foundation. It gives me great pleasure to present a cheque to the OTIS foundation for \$2792.00."

Carlie spoke about how much the Otis representatives had enjoyed the evening and how surprised and delighted Paul Gray was regarding the generosity of the Redesdale people. She said that Paul was passionate about the cause and was quite overwhelmed on the night. Paul had said how Redesdale had 'embraced the project' and turned it into a reality. From the floor, Association member Hilary Jankelson wanted Carlie to take a message back to Emma Gray about how appreciative and impressed the Redesdale people had been that at such a tender age she had bravely stood up and talked about her late mother.

After applause from the floor Jo continued, "The Association has also committed to supporting the local school swimming programme for three years. The Association, together with the principal of the school thought it imperative for our local children to learn to swim, especially with all the damns that we have around here."

When the new School Principal, Mr Sebire, arrived in February, he noticed that the school library was old, dated and that none of the children were interested in them. The lack of up-to-date books meant that the children were disadvantaged when it came to reading competitions. The library needed reviving. When the school submitted a grant application to the Association earlier, it was a unanimous committee decision to support this request through the Association's Community Chest. This was made possible through the Dinner+Talk event held recently."

EUROPEAN WASP SEASON

by Laurie Nicoll

Firstly I am not a scientist or entomologist just a keen observer, and inventor of Shamp featured on ABC's New Inventors www.shamp.com.au I live in central Vic. on 2 acres of bushland and have been studying the habits of the European wasp for 10 + years and believe all methods tried so far to get rid of them i.e. baiting with poison, to take back to nest, the parasitic wasp (1997 trial) to eat lava has failed. I have also tried other methods when nests have formed but so far none have worked apart from finding and dusting them! I believe the main component in the cycle is the Queen which is overlooked! It seems that waiting for nests to be formed then take action is what's in everyone's mind I have developed a method to catch the queen before she makes a nest. My idea is cheap, environmentally friendly, recyclable and safe, easy to make and most household will have ingredients for bait!

For this idea to work it needs people power, if every household put out 4 traps the number of nests formed would be reduced greatly.

In 2013 I caught 174 queen wasps with this method and similar numbers during a 4 year trial period. Unfortunately due to knee op I was unable to tend traps last year 2014 and 2015 has been the worst year I have encountered.

Because my idea starts in spring and most nests die off during winter people become complacent because there are no wasps around until it's too late!

The queen comes out of hibernation in spring with two priorities in mind #1 to build nest and #2 feed herself which is carbohydrates until she has workers take over.

My method uses a 1.25 lt soft drink bottle with 3 holes aprox .10mm diameter about 100mm from bottom of bottle and a bait made from honey, water and a little pure vanilla essence which ferments in sun. The traps need a little tending until Jan. meaning once full removing catch, reusing and topping up bait, replace cap.

And finally I am not intending to gain financially from this idea its FREE to anyone who wants to use this method! I can send pics of trap and 2013 catch if required Laurie Nicoll
