



# BEVERLY STUD ON-FARM RAM SALE

Continuing on from last year's success, the second annual Beverley On-farm Ram Sale was held on the last Friday of September drawing a large crowd of bidders, interested locals and onlookers to the merino stud's "Corra" property. As a stud well known for their show-winning sheep, potential buyers flooded the pens over the course of the day, each eager to secure a piece of Beverly's sought after bloodlines for their own flocks.

With a total of 48 superfine and ultrafine merino rams on offer and 44 sold, the average price was considerably high at \$1481.

Amongst those dedicated to finding their next stud sire were a number of Tasmanian buyers who bought a multitude of rams now destined for the Apple-Isle. Local buyers were in force with support also coming from the Western districts and North-East of the state.



## **FLAK** at Heathcote

Heathcote is so fortunate to have productions from the Engine Room each year, coordinated by Maree Hingston with support from Barbara Clement and directed by Helen Ellis. Exceptional are the one person performances, FLAK on Wednesday 21 October 2015, 8pm in the RSL hall being another brilliant evening.

Michael Veitch, a consummate actor, made us feel each pilot real as he told "True stories from men who flew in World War Two". He came on stage as a true blue Aussie sitting at his desk telling of the 10,000 young men, all volunteers and minimally trained, flying big black Lancaster bombers. He was shot down by the Swedes on 8th February 1945 flying over the North Sea above Helsubing, Sweden with all lights blazing on his 29th trip when 30 trips made a tour of duty.

Michael paused to come towards the audience telling of his boyhood passion for aeroplanes. He made it his goal to track down all the men who had flown in the Battle for Britain and from his meetings the performance was born, illustrated with overhead projections of aeroplanes and pilots. An intriguing interlude of the evening was a projection of failed aeroplanes of WW2 which were of course never made public. Michael had an amusing story of a German pilot asking the English why they were flying such a stupid plane. Then by chance Michael came across the name of a German pilot who after the war met with his English counterpart and became friends. In a dressing gown, calling Michael "cobber",

The fifth pilot was another Australian, who spoke of his wife, a teacher of French and German, who was invited to a reunion after the War, planes of both sides bearing the same numbers. She was "treated like a queen" and former enemies rejoiced that they could now be friends.

Concluding with a projection of a British pilot whom Michael asked what he would like to say, the pilot replied, "Not always, and not necessarily often, but occasionally to be remembered."

The evening was not only an acting tour de force but a powerful evocation of humanity in the midst of war.

# Hello Everyone and welcome to our new regular medical spot.

#### Today Dr Tim talks about hayfever:

We all know hay fever from tv commercials showing brides destroying bouquets in a single sneeze, if not from personal experience of the frequent and annoying symptoms it produces. It is perhaps not surprising then that, faced with the bewildering array of options, it can be difficult deciding what is most suitable to treat this common and sometimes disabling condition.

An ounce of prevention of course is worth more than a pound of cure, but eliminating wattle and rye grass from our beautiful rural landscape is just not going to happen.

Furthermore, closeting oneself in the hermetically sealed house for three months of the year doesn't bode well for ones mental health.

The options for treatment are often given as oral antihistamines or intranasal sprays of varying sorts. But while oral antihistamines work biochemically right where the action is and they are easy to take, side effects can make them problematic. Nasal sprays are usually steroidal medications which provide effective localised immune suppression but as is usual with these medications, lack an immediate effect - not great when we get surprised by a sudden surge in pollen counts on warm and windy days.

Is a combination of medications the answer to effective immediate relief as well as keeping overall medication use to a minimum? Certainly this type of strategy has worked well for asthma control, and it appears that a similar strategy now may work for hay fever - could be good news for those of you for whom the onset of Spring brings on nasal congestion similar to a couple of rounds with Mike Tyson.

Until later, take care and happy holidays.

# The Battle of the Bridge by Rod Gibson

Redesdale's cricketers were again greeted with an ominous weather forecast on Sunday November 1st; the third day of the Redesdale Festival. Our previous match, in April, against Axe Creek began in similarly overcast conditions but, as with this earlier match, our much anticipated contest with Mia Mia was played predominately in sunshine. Readers north of the Campaspe will be aware that the Mia Mia club was reformed in 2014 and has since been playing regularly in the local C grade competition.

The game was scheduled for 30 overs per side, no batsman could be declared out before scoring and a score of 30 meant compulsory retirement with the option of re entering the fray should all other batsmen be out.

Only three wickets fell to the hard working Redesdale bowling attack and two of them, Messrs M and J O'Sullivan scored 29 and 24 respectively. Both of these wickets fell to Redesdale opening batsman Chris Barber. The final Mia Mia score of 237, made at just under 8 an over,

The final Mia Mia score of 237, made at just under 8 an over, was both entertaining for the growing crowd and a somewhat daunting proposition for Paul Atkins and his red shirted "Redesdale Rockets".

At this point lunch was taken with players and spectators devouring copious quantities of slow cooked lamb, pork, baked potatoes and salad prepared by Les Pocock , Lindsay Booker and crew. Barman Tas Johnson was also kept busy as many spectators and the odd player decided the sun was well and truly "over the yardarm". Once again, Dino Tomisic from the General Store, generously provided wine and beer at cost price for the occasion assisting the community to make a profit from the event which will go towards financing the imminent pavilion redevelopment.

Tom May and Chris Barber walked out to face some hostile bowling from the Mia Mia opening pair of J O'Sullivan and A Conforti who proved hard to get away. The normally fluent and attacking May struggled early before eventually retiring at 30 after a flurry of fours. Barber, as usual, went on the attack and 5 of his 8 scoring shots were fours. He was out caught for 23 trying to hit Conforti out of the ground. Redesdale wickets fell too regularly and the runs required per over mounted gradually. Paul Atkins, leading by example, raced to 30 after being "bogged down" for a time,

retired, then later returned to the crease taking his overall score to 60 n. o. His innings included 4 sixes and 6 fours. But for a late cameo of 20 by veteran Jock Macrae, Redesdale ran out of time and wickets with their score on 193.

Mia Mia's 44 run victory was a fair result and reflected greater batting depth and a faster scoring rate. It is possibly also worth mentioning the average age of the Mia Mia side was "slightly" below that of their opponents!

As players mingled over a beer or two after the game, the winners trophy was presented to Martin Leahy. Some followers will remember Tim Barber walking to the wicket in the first CROWS vs COLTS game wearing a stainless steel helmet he expertly made in replica of that worn by Ned Kelly at Glenrowan in 1879.

# <u>8</u> Recipe of the Month



#### **Christmas shortbread**

Makes about 24 biscuits
225 unsalted butter, softened
75g icing sugar, sifted
1 tsp vanilla extract
225 g plain flour (plus extra for rolling)
50g cocoa (if making chocolate shortbread)
Pinch of salt

To make the dough, cream the butter and icing sugar until pale and light. Mix in vanilla extract. Sift the flour (and cocoa if using for chocolate shortbread) and salt, add to the mixture and beat until smooth. Flatten dough to a disc shape, wrap in cling film and chill until firm.

Preheat oven to 180°C and line a backing dish with baking paper. Dust the rolling surface with flour and roll dough out to a thickness of about 3mm. Using cookie cutters, stamp out the shapes and arrange on baking paper. Roll scraps into a ball and repeat to use up all dough.

Bake in the middle shelf for around 12 to 15 mins, until crisp and pale golden. Cool on baking sheets. package in a decorative tin, box or bag as a gift.

#### Variations:

Almond: add 75g of finely chopped or ground almonds.

Hazelnut: add 75g finely chopped or ground hazlenuts.

Morello cherry: add chopped dried morello cherries.

Lemon: leave out chocolate or vanilla and use 1 tsp lemon extract, 1 tablespoon of finely chopped candied lemon peel and grated zest of one lemon.




