Dear Editor,

There are concerns within the livestock industry that their levy money could be used to subsidise government projects instead of funding priority biosecurity measures.

The Cattle and Sheep and Goat Compensation Funds are in place to ensure there is money available to livestock producers in the case of a major biosecurity outbreak.

Some of the funds also go toward preventative biosecurity projects, as chosen by a committee of industry representatives.

But for the past four months there has been no committee to say where the money should go, because Agriculture Minister Jaala Pulford has failed to announce the new members.

And when guestioned by The Nationals this week in Parliament, the Minister refused to rule out using the levy funds to subsidise her department's costs.

Something just doesn't add up.

Jaala Pulford must explain her intentions to livestock producers, who are rightly concerned their levy money could be redirected to other projects - putting their industry's biosecurity at risk.



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

Your Health!

Well the temperatures are finally starting to settle as we head into autumn and as usual at this time of year my thoughts turn to the immunisation "season" that is about to commence. It has been an interesting few weeks and some of you may have noticed that I made an appearance on the Bendigo news commenting about immunisation, in the light of most recent data from the Australian Childhood Immunisation Register, which suggests that Kyneton, amongst other local government areas, is falling behind in our immunisation rates for children.

The Department of Health sets targets for immunisation rates in children, not only because it is good for those who get immunised, but as the rates of immunisation increase the likelihood of transmission of an infection in unimmunised individuals correspondingly decreases.

There really are very few reasons not to get children immunised these days - the vaccines used are much much safer than buying a car and not many of us would have any trouble selecting a car to drive away if it was provided for free!

Of note of course are the various State and Federal government initiatives to encourage immunisation in children as much as possible. Conscientious objection is still an option for parents but comes with significant disincentives - the so-called no jab-no pay and no jab-no play policies - the message there is to expect to keep your children at home a lot more than your neighbours if that is your wish - personally I would strongly recommend against it.

With Zika virus, the Brunswick measles outbreak, new Hepatitis C treatments in the wings and of course the new Flu vaccine, there is lots "going on" in the virology field both locally and internationally which is exciting because all of these stories show that we can win over the viruses - watch this space! **Dr Tim**



Water relief for platypus population

The North Central Catchment Management Authority (CMA) is coordinating a small but important water release to the Coliban River downstream of Malmsbury Reservoir. About 50ML a day for three days, plus ramp up and ramp down will be released from the reservoir later in the coming days.

The release is in line with the scientific flow recommendations for the system and will benefit the river by maintaining in-stream and bank vegetation, cuing fish movement, mixing water within the river and inundating snag habitat.

One of Australia's most-loved animals – the platypus – will also benefit from the release. Before the recent decade-long drought, platypus foraging around the banks of the Coliban River was a common sight.

However, a lack of water had a severe impact on their population and a deeper Coliban River is aimed at helping them spread and helping protect them from predators like foxes. North Central CMA Environmental Water Manager Andrew Sharpe said the release was prioritised in the Victorian Environmental Water Holder's Seasonal Watering Plan 2015-16. "River-level rises and falls may be noticed, alongside changes to water flow rate and colour, as the water makes its way to Lake Eppalock," he said.

Mr Sharpe said environmental flows were vital for river health and biodiversity.

"Environmental water keeps waterways – and the life within and around them – healthy. This also has ongoing benefits for recreation (such as fishing) as well as the homes and farms that rely on rivers for clean water."

Up to \$700 million secured for regional Victoria

The Liberal-Nationals have secured three times as much funding for regional Victoria from the sale of the Port of Melbourne lease than was offered by Daniel Andrews.

Teaming up for Campaspe flows

Close cooperation between the North Central Catchment Management Authority (CMA) and Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) has meant irrigation flows have helped maintain the health of the Campaspe River without the need for environmental water over summer.

North Central CMA Environmental Water Manager Andrew Sharpe said both organisations had capitalised on the timing of irrigation flows.

"More than 18,000 megalitres has flowed out of Eppalock since the start of December, for irrigators and for Bendigo's urban supply," he said.

"We were able to work with GMW to manage the timing of their irrigation and water-transfer flows to best suit the health of the river and the animals and plants that rely on it for survival.

"While small in comparison, our cooperation meant about 1,700 ML stayed in Eppalock over summer."

Mr Sharpe said the first planned flow for autumn was also made with irrigation water in the lower part of the river.

COUNCIL STRESSES IMPORTANCE OF INTENSIVE ANIMAL INDUSTRY

The importance of the intensive animal industry to Greater Bendigo and the wider region is stressed in a submission from Greater Bendigo City Council to the State Government's Animal Industries Advisory Committee.

The advisory committee has been established by the Minister for Planning to provide advice to him and the Minister for Agriculture on appropriate planning provisions for the sector, which includes broiler farms and piggeries.

Mayor Cr Rod Fyffe said the Council has a strong commitment to maintaining and supporting intensive animal industries.

"The sector is one of the major employment industries across the City of Greater Bendigo employing around 2,000 people directly and indirectly," Cr Fyffe said.

"Intensive Animal Industries make up most of our local food production and processing sector, which is worth about \$500M in total output to the Greater Bendigo economy

"There is capacity and private sector support to further expand this sector to create more jobs for our community.

"To aid this, Council believes it is vital that the sector be given certainty through the Victoria's land planning system."

The Council's submission states:

"Once established and operating with the appropriate permits and controls through state wide industry codes operators should not be subject to uncertainty due to issues like protecting biosecurity and amenity complaints from adjoining landholders."

It adds that planning provisions in the Farming Zone should clearly show the land has been designated for primary industry production and that uses such as dwellings need to be restricted within the buffer distances of existing intensive animal operations.

The submission argues that minimum buffers should be uniform across the State as such action would assist "everyone" with property owners knowing where they can and cannot build a dwelling.

The current ad hoc approach with different rules for different municipalities and even different rules within municipalities is confusing and leads to uncertainty for the sector and for people wanting to build a house.

"The potential to apply an absolute prohibition (on new dwellings) in close proximity should be considered," the submission states, adding that work undertaken by the City has found such a move in Greater Bendigo will hardly impact any landowners in the Farming Zone.

Prior to the establishment of the advisory committee, the City was proposing a Planning Scheme Amendment requiring a planning permit in the Farming Zone within 500m of a broiler shed and 700m of a piggery. Of the 600 parcels of land located within the zone, just four could not locate a house more than 500m from the existing intensive animal industry operation.

Cr Fyffe said the industry was a vital component of the local and regional economy and the Council looked forward to the advisory committee taking on board the recommendations in the submission and to the Government providing much-needed certainty for the sector.

Memories of a long history of music in Mia Mia

Marjory Coates penned these notes to Steven Colman (Coliban Park Road, Redesdale) in February this year. It may jog some memories for other Mia Mia people. If so, please write in.

"Dear Steven - On Tuesday 2nd February 2016, Murray Sandland and I had lunch at the Old Fire Brigade Cafe in Preston as I wanted to show him a copy of the note I had recently given to you. The note talked about the visit of my brother Arthur (lyric tenor), me (as soprano) and Murray Sandland (as our accompanist) to Mia Mia. We gave an evening of singing at the Mia Mia Hall. I think it was the late 1970s or perhaps the late 60s? Murray thought it was the late 60s as in 1970 he had gone to Sydney to study tropical diseases as part of his work as a doctor at Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital. Arthur had been very ill for many months in 1973 with a virus. When he recovered he married in 1974 and his wife had not been around in the late 60s. Also Murray said our trip to Mia Mia had been an offshoot of a concert the three of us had given in our own church hall.

The Concert we had given at our church was Murray's suggestion. We sang a mix of two centuries of English music accompanied by madrigals. We sang Arne, Purcell and Benjamin Britten, to name a few. We had performed Britten's 'Abraham and Isaac' originally written for Peter Pears and a famous English contralto.

Our choirmaster at the time was Cliff Rees and he was married to Margaret Fergusen who came from Mia Mia.

Murray says that what is in my original note to you is basically correct. I think we were guests at a dinner at Spring Plains with a lot of local people.

Murray's mother attended the Mia Mia Church and she was a teacher at Spring Plains for two years when she was single and went by the name of Muriel Morton. She boarded on the Spring Plains property with the owners. The father's name was Rupert Knight. There were two boys who attended the school. Their names were Gordon and Barry. I'm told Gordon had a winery. Murray tells me that it was on the Spring Plains property that the first aeroplane rose two feet above the ground!

I seem to be able to remember wearing a very elegant peacock blue fitted full length evening gown for the occasion of the concert. We think that concert parties at the Mia Mia Hall were not unusual and that Mr Rees had something to do with this."

The Bridge: GARDEN PATCH

Redesdale Ramblings: Some Autumn Bulbs in Central Victoria

With the cooler weather we start to see the awakening of the garden after the dearth of summer. One of the first signs of the change of the season is the flowering of bulbs such as Amaryllis belladonna (below), often just called "Belladonna-lilies" or "naked ladies" (because the flowers emerge before the leaves).



They originally come from South Africa and are suited to the conditions in most of southern Australia, especially here in Central Vic where they bloom at the end of summer. Often seen in paddocks where a house once stood, they are great survivors and thrive on neglect. The wild form is candy-pink but several variations and hybrids are available including a cerise/ deep pink form which is reputed to have arisen in this area. Some of the strongest forms are the white ones with an old hybrid called 'Hathor' having tall stems topped by a circle of white trumpets with yellow throats. When you get a new bulb (which can be as big as an emu egg) don't bury it completely, leave the top couple of centimetres out of the ground (unless you get extreme frosts) and plant them where they get a good amount of sunshine and preferably where you won't be watering over the summer. The profuse foliage which emerges with the autumn rains can easily overpower smaller, weaker plants so you have to be aware of this when siting them. It's why they're often planted along a fence-line away from other more delicate plants.

Sternbergias are sometimes called autumn crocuses but this is simply sloppy naming as they aren't crocuses and aren't even in the same family – they actually are amaryllids, the same family as daffodils, crinums, hippeastrums and, of course, amaryllis. There are a few types available here: the commonest is Sternbergia lutea and it can make quite a show when the bulbs clump up. In autumn they hold up golden-yellow, egg-sized goblets which expand in the sunshine. A smaller one is called Sternbergia sicula and comes from Crete. It has starrier flowers but can produce a number of them over a few weeks before the leaves

develop. Luckily our climate is similar to where it comes from so it is well adapted to prosper. In our garden it produces seed as well as offsets so it can multiply and be spread around wherever you want them.



The Mediterranean region is home to many autumn flowering bulbs which do well locally these include Sternbergias, cyclamen, crocus, colchicums and even narcissus. Most people may not know that there are daffodils which flower at this time of the year; they just don't look much like Wordsworth's golden host. The first and weirdest one is called the "green daffodil" but could be more likened to an olive-green jonquil. Narcissus viridiflorus has narrow petals and a very short cup but is the parent of some intriguing new hybrids which introduce a greenish shade to the colour range. Narcissus elegans, Narcissus serotinus and Narcissus obsoletus are very similar to each other: they have white petals and short yellow to orange cups looking a bit like a Narcissus tazetta with which they have been crossed to raise some vigorous hybrids such as 'First Stanza'. (See below)



Another autumn daffodil called Narcissus cavanilesii is pure yellow but with virtually no cup so looks more like a small sternbergia on a long stem! This is not one that I'm growing yet but if you have, please let me know! The value of these species to breeders is that they can lengthen the flowering season by being crossed with some of the spring flowering daffodils.

Forget about the large and overblown Florist

Cyclamen and try some of the wild species which are becoming available from some of the specialist growers such as Dicksonia Rare Plants Nursery and The Garden Tap.



There are a few that bloom in autumn and my favourite is Cyclamen graecum (see above) which can be either pink or white and can have very interesting foliage which follows after the flowers as the seed pods are developing. Interestingly the seeds are very attractive to ants and wasps which can steal them all, leaving you just the empty pods! Some of the seeds will later germinate away from the parent plant where the insects have dropped them. If you can save some of the seeds you can sow them in autumn in the garden or in a pot using a quick draining potting-mix and topping the seeds with a layer of fine gravel or coarse sand to block out light which helps them germinate. If the seeds have dried out it may help them to be soaked overnight in water to which you add a drop of dish-washing liquid (this helps break the surface tension, allowing the seeds to absorb moisture to swell up and commence the germination process). There are many other autumn bulbs but these ones are fairly indestructible in our area. All need similar conditions: average to good soil which doesn't get waterlogged and is kept dry during summer; they do better in full sun, or just light shade, such as under a deciduous tree; they don't need heavy feeding as that would lead to excessive leaf growth which is susceptible to disease and frost damage. A gravel mulch can help reduce weed growth and keep the flowers from getting splattered with mud. A raised bed or a rock garden would be ideal for most except the most vigorous.

The Bridge: GARDEN PATCH



My humble request of all readers is to continue to dance naked in the moonlight. It looks as if it may be successful in bringing on the rain. At the end of March we can begin to contemplate what we may plant to make up for all the summer deaths. Around the start of April and before our day on national celebration, that is Anzac, we could take cuttings from the salvias and plant them directly into the ground. Bless then with a spadeful of animal excreta but not that from the chooks. They will look very sick over the winter but bounce into life around September. Convovulus will grow from cuttings so try some of them to fill gaps. Most of the myoporums also procreate, much like social workers, that is without the benefit of copulation. Cuttings can also be placed directly into the ground. I don't use the word "soil" as very few have any of that commodity in our area. Some that do, use it for the cultivation of illegal vegetable matter, about which I know nothing.

Back to the legitimate garden. Around April begin to shield sensitive shrubs from the impending frosts. Things like Jacarandas or even the dreaded Hydrangeas should be surrounded with shade cloth and that will get them through the winter.

Now for some suggestions about winter plantings. Rejoice in the name of Australian Natives. II cannot give them a generic clan name or ask that you acknowledge them as the custodians of the land and their elders past and present, but I can identify the sturdiest of them. Acacia Cognata come in bush and dwarf forms. With their splendid, pandurate leaves and dense habit, they are useful as large hedges or border plants. The graceful and abundant E. caesia aka Silver Princess, are an excellent choice. They are shallow rooted, relatively quick growing, but can die unexpectedly and mostly after about 15/20 years. They attract the New Holland honeyeaters and some wrens both of which do not nest in them. If you want

something spectacular I suggest Alyogynes, there is an indigenous purple one which looks like a school blazer on a Wesley student and you only need an Acacia of any of the golden varieties to complete the uniform.

Those who occasionally attend the Redesdale Hotel will be aware of the presence of the above trophy which is in the form of a very good replica of the helmet worn by Ned Kelly at the Glenrowan Inn on June 28th 1880. The Redesdale and Mia Mia cricket teams first competed for this prize on the Redesdale Oval on November 1st last year. Mia Mia won this inaugural contest by a convincing 44 runs in the 30 overs per side match.

Seeking revenge, 11 of Redesdale's finest, under the leadership of Paul Atkins, crossed the bridge on Saturday 19th March and took to the recently mowed Mia Mia oval wearing their red Redesdale Rockets T shirts. As Mia Mia compete regularly in the Emu Creek league (finishing 5th this season) a tough contest was anticipated as the local opening batsmen strode to the pitch.

Popular Redesdale barman, Justin Greet, opened the bowling for the visitors and his pace immediately proved a handful as the batsmen struggled to get him away. His 3 over spell yielded 1 for 1. The scoring rate was subdued as both the outfield and pitch were slow due to the recent heavy rains and the Redesdale fielding was generally speaking, excellent. Wickets fell steadily in the meantime with Nathan Phillips and Andrew Ferrington each picking up 2. Ferrington's second wicket was a highlight as Brett Thompson middled a short ball with ferocious power, pulling it straight to Greet at deep square leg. The ball hit the fielder in the chest (the sound of which travelled half way around the ground) bounced up and was caught.

Bowling honours, however, went to Redesdale and Mia Mia Primary School Headmaster, Mr Joe Sebire, who abandoned the wicket keeping pads some 20 overs into the innings and proceeded to take no less than 3 for none off his three overs! For the home side only 3 players made double figures; Will O'Sullivan with 14 and Greg Dempster and Nick White each with 21. The rear guard actions of the latter helped the final score reach, an at times unlikely, 92. No doubt on the much smaller Redesdale ground it would have been 30 or 40 runs higher.

Lunch was taken with pulled lamb or pork rolls with coleslaw and condiments being enjoyed by all while ice cream and a variety of drinks were also on offer.

At about 2pm the versatile Greet-Barber combination also opened the batting for Redesdale and the pair raced to 40 before Greet was caught and bowled for 18. An excellent foundation had been laid. Nathan Phillips joined Chris Barber and both continued to attack the bowling until the latter was forced to retire on 33. His 3 games for Redesdale have netted almost 100 runs at an average of close to 50. In addition Phillips made 13 and newcomer Ben Barwick made a late order 17 no which included two successive sixes; the only two for the match and a great effort on this big ground. Bowling honours were shared. The final score was 120 for 9.

Seamus McKenna, duly presented the winners trophy to Paul Atkins and both captains agreed it had had been an enjoyable contest played in good spirit. Both teams and spectators then retired to enjoy a beer and some of the remaining food while reminiscing about the day's events. A rematch is likely in November 2016. The trophy meanwhile will be returned to the bar of the Redesdale Hotel where it will double as an item of curiosity, hopefully, for years to come.

10 Recipe of the Month



GARTH'S ROAST CAULIFLOWER & PUMPKIN SALAD

From the **Redesdale Hotel** comes this delicious recipe:

- 1. Take 1 head of Cauliflower and 1 small butternut pumpkin. Cut them into small pieces, spray with olive oil, coat with spices such as cumin, harrisa, (optional), and middle eastern seasoning then roast in oven until cooked.
- 2. Cook up french lentils and freekeh(optional) then drain. You can substitute quinoa or farro for the freekeh. Another option is to soak chick peas overnight. Coat chickpeas with spices and olive oil then roast in oven.
- 3. Make dressing with honey, 1 teasp. zest of orange and lime plus juice, salt and pepper, and EVOO.
- 4. Mix all ingredients together in a bowl. Add fresh mint, parsley or coriander, 1 thinly sliced red onion, pomegranate, pistachio nuts, currants. When using chickpeas you could use dates or dried cranberries instead of currants.
