Swift response to anthrax incident

Over the weekend, Agriculture Victoria veterinarians and animal health staff responded to the positive identification of anthrax on a property near Swan Hill.

Victoria's Chief Veterinary Officer, Dr Charles Milne, said the affected property had now been quarantined and appropriate biosecurity protections were in place.

"We are urging local farmers to continue to be vigilant and report any symptoms in livestock that may be related to anthrax," Dr Milne said. Anthrax is not a concern for the public:

Anthrax does not spread rapidly and is not contagious.

• There is no general public health risk associated with anthrax.

• Any risk is confined to people who handle dead livestock such as farmers, veterinarians and knackery workers.

There is no impact on local produce or food safety.

Anthrax is caused by a naturally occurring bacteria, Bacillus anthracis, which is known to exist in soil in parts of Northern Victoria. Dr Milne said it was not unusual for incidents of anthrax to be detected in cattle and sheep in the region, with several farms in the Swan Hill area affected in March 2017 and a property in March this year.

"Incidents tend to occur during the warmer months when it's drier and livestock forage deeper into the soil when eating grass," Dr Milne said. "We are well prepared to handle these incidents and we are currently contacting local farmers and veterinarians."

Dr Milne said all sheep on the affected property had now been vaccinated. The current evidence suggests that one property has been affected.

Agriculture Victoria will continue to work with nearby farmers, veterinarians and the local community to monitor the situation.

A brief history of time

The idea of dividing the day into 24 hours dates back to the ancient Egyptians. The Romans cut up the day into 12 periods of equal length that they called hours – but which actually varied in duration according to the time of the year, from about 45 minutes in winter to 75 in summer. This wasn't very precise but it gave them their own version of daylight saving. Measuring time – done by sundial and water clock, if at all – remained an impressionistic business until the 17th century, when the pendulum clock was introduced. Even so, until the 19th century, time was a local affair.

That all changed with the railways. In Britain, the Great Western Railway went first, standardising its timetable based on Greenwich Mean Time. The other railways followed and, despite some local resistance, in 1880 the Statutes (Definition of Time) Act set a standard time for the whole of Britain. In 1884, at a conference in Washington DC, an international



standard was agreed. All localities would use the same time, base on Greenwich as the prime or zero meridian, and the world would be divided into 24 time zones. Today, the same system, somewhat refined, is called Universal Time.

It is recommended that you check these dates with the market website if possible.

Cancer compensation

Member for Euroa and Deputy Leader of The Nationals Steph Ryan today said a Guy-Walsh Government had vowed to introduce a Presumptive Legislation Bill in the first parliamentary sitting week of 2019, if elected this November.

Ms Ryan said the bill would ensure all career and volunteer firefighters have fair and timely access to cancer compensation. "Labor lied to firefighters when they promised this vital piece of legislation would be introduced within 100 days of the 2014 state election."When Labor finally introduced their proposed laws they discriminated against volunteer firefighters who were not covered and tied the cancer compensation to reforms to tear apart the CFA. "Every day CFA volunteers leave their families to saves lives and keep us safe. I am committed to protecting their rights."

The Nationals' presumptive legislation would cover the 12 specified diseases consistent with the legislation previously introduced in Parliament.

Victoria is currently the only state in Australia that doesn't offer cancer presumptive rights compensation to volunteer firefighters.



Labor blows last chance on rail

The Andrews Labor Government has blown its last chance to deliver for regional rail, failing to include the north east and Shepparton train lines in its long awaited 'regional rail' plan.

Member for Euroa and Deputy Leader of The Nationals Steph Ryan said regional Victorians could be left with no doubt about where Labor's priorities lie. "Daniel Andrews has made it painfully clear that the north east and Shepparton train lines do not matter to a Labor government," Ms Ryan said.

"This week's announcement that Labor will spend \$340 million for 18 new trains on the Ballarat and Geelong lines is an affront to people living along any of the other long haul train lines across Victoria.

"Despite appalling punctuality and reliability, and having some of the oldest rolling stock in the state, the north east and Shepparton lines did not even rate a mention in Labor's plan. "It's time someone told the premier that regional Victoria is much more than just Geelong and Ballarat."

Ms Ryan said Daniel Andrew's had promised new rolling stock for the north east line, but with less than two weeks until the election, time had run out. "Daniel Andrews stood in Wangaratta in April 2016 and said he would buy new trains for the north east line if the Federal government provided money to fix the track," Ms Ryan said.

"We have been successful in securing millions for track works from the Federal Coalition, but Daniel Andrews has completely failed regional commuters along the north east line, backing down on his promise to buy new trains.

"Just 10 days out from an election, Labor's big announcement for regional rail doesn't include most of Victorian's regional rail network. In government The Nationals will buy new trains for all of Victoria's long haul."

Labor will extend preschool access to 3 year olds

Lisa Chesters MP was today joined by Shadow Treasurer Chris Bowen MP to confirm Labor's commitment to funding preschool for both 3 and 4 year olds.

"Access to affordable preschool and kinder programs should be a priority for any Government.

"Federal and State Labor will work together to guarantee permanent funding for preschool and kinder programs. This is the biggest investment ever made in early childhood education in Australia," said Mr Bowen.

"Local teachers and centres have told me that the current cost of three year old kinder is the main barrier when it comes to accessing programs.

"From 2021, every 3 and 4 year old in the Bendigo electorate will be able to access 15 hours of subsidised early childhood education and I know how excited many local families will be about this.

"We know that 90% of a child's brain development occurs in the first five years of life so it is vital families are given this support to get the best start for their children," said Ms Chesters.

Labor will also extend the current arrangement for four year olds accessing preschool programs – creating a quality, two-year program that boosts development in the most important years of a child's development, an investment of an additional \$1.75 billion into early education

"The Liberals see education as a cost – that's why they've cut \$14 billion from public schools and left preschool funding in limbo. Labor sees it as an investment in our collective future.

"Labor will work in partnership with the states and territories to deliver this important reform, including in setting enrolment and attendance targets, particularly for Indigenous and vulnerable children. "We've made tough and overdue decisions to rein in unfair tax concessions that predominantly benefit the wealthy – including negative gearing reform and dividend imputation reform – so we can fund the priorities that will make a fairer and more successful nation," said Mr Bowen.

This announcement supports the Victorian State Government's funding commitment to preschool.

Redesdale Ramblings:

Giving you the Hebe geebies!

The genus Veronica is huge and has species in both Old and New Worlds. However a long time ago taxonomists decided that all the ones in New Zealand and Australia belonged in their own genera. So most of the kiwis became Hebe and Aussies became things like Derwentia. With the modern DNA techniques lo and behold, the hebes are now back in Veronica – they weren't a separate genus afterall and the DNA studies prove it! What does it mean for us gardeners? Not much really. Except for changing the labels on your plants – if you can be bothered.

The shrubby hebes are a welcome addition to any garden, whether in the mixed border, the rock garden or as hedging, all depending on the size of the plants used. In the rock garden 'Emerald Green' also known as 'Green Globe' is aptly named with tight growth of small bright green leaves. When young it can be a focal point in the rock garden but will eventually get too large. However it can be grown as part of a dwarf hedge instead or kept small by severe clipping.

A lot of the taller growing hebes are excellent as short term hedging and the purple leaf forms are especially attractive. There is the added feature of spikes of flowers. The colour of these varies from pure white (especially in the species) to purples and pinks with shades in between.

Some of the trailing veronicas (commonly called "Speedwells") are very useful to grow at the edge of a garden bed with a softening effect for hard edging or brickwork. Veronica umbrosa 'Georgia Blue' was a popular edging a few years ago and can still be found in some of the bigger nurseries as "tubestock" with sprays of small blue flowers in the late spring to early summer. There are also mauve or lilac forms sometimes seen.

We got a native Veronica plebia (below) from a stall at the Wesley Hill Market.



Its label says it should have small blue flowers but ours are pale pink! Possibly this is because it's being grown in pots in a shady area; it will be interesting to see if the colour is different in more sun. Like a lot of speedwells its trailing stems can put down roots where they touch the soil so this is a good way of getting more plants. It also sets seed which is another way to increase your stocks of this pretty trailer. A similar trailer from Turkey is the "Thyme Leafed Speedwell", Veronica oltensis



which has bright blue flowers in short spikes. This is another one that should be suitable for a sunny spot in the garden but we are yet to plant it out.

Another native is "Digger's Speedwell", Derwentia perfoliata (below), which has sprawling stems of bluey-green foliage and spikes of mauve flowers.



This is best grown among taller shrubs so that it can climb through them to flower. Being a plant of the Goldfields it is suited to our conditions and if you can establish it by planting in autumn or winter it should survive with little water over the summer.

There are a number of other perennial species and they are becoming popular again. "Antique Perennials" Wholesale Nursery has released a few "new" varieties which can be found at "The Garden Tap" in Kyneton or "Collectaflora" in Woodend in their distinctive purple pots.

How well will you sleep the night before Christmas? Will you be sleeping like the proverbial baby, with visions of sugarplums dancing through your head? Who indeed ever gave birth to the proverbial baby that sleeps so beautifully? Or are you the hapless parent perhaps, late to bed, no doubt after spending days prior getting the house tidied and ready for the big day! Certainly if every visit from St Nick was as noisy as that described in the classic children's poem then noone the world over would get any sleep at all. Jolly old St Nick does everything to break the midwinter silence, except speaking to his startled audience of one in front of the chimney!

Sleep is a fascinating topic of health, because there is so much myth that we have created around it, and because there has been a sparsity of science fact until relatively recent times. Our efforts to investigate the issues of sleep have ranged from the awfully inhuman sleep deprivation studies performed long ago by various military services, to the ethically sound, scientifically rigorous, and even comfortable medical studies of today.

It is certain that good sleep is good for your general health, and that important restorative processes happen within your body during sleep. At its best, it is a well coordinated interplay of hormones including melatonin and numerous other hormones which make you unconscious and comfortable, whilst the mind goes through it's "defragging" maintenance mode - to borrow the computer term. The dreams we all commonly experience through sleep are apparently not necessary for a perfect nights rest however - no matter how fondly they might be remembered!

Deprivation does lead to bad consequences on the other hand. The world record for going without sleep is around 11 days, but attempts to better this should really be avoided. People have died trying to stay awake as long as this. All mammals sleep - giraffes for only about

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two hours, while cats sleep a lot of the night, and the day too. And then there are those animals that hibernate through a whole winter! There is much variety amongst humans too - some people live very productive happy and healthy lives on as little as four or five hours a night, whilst others show clear signs of sleep deprivation on just a little less than twice that amount.

It is as important to recognise that as individuals we need enough sleep, whatever our personal requirements are, as it is important to recognise that not getting enough may indicate the presence of significant health problems. Be active in preparing yourself for sleep - keep potential distractions away, turn down the lighting, avoid the sudden nod-off on the couch which could mean you are over-tired. If it's difficult to get to sleep, warm milk and honey and lullabies are a good way to help get to the land of nod. Many other natural foods and behavioural techniques also help induce sleep.

If you have tried everything you can think of at home for a good nights sleep and still can't wake up feeling rested then it may be time to talk with your doctor.

One condition which is increasingly recognised as a cause of poor sleep and health generally is Obstructive Sleep Apnoea, where muscles around your airway collapse and temporarily halt breathing. Other recognised sleep disorders include Restless Leg Syndrome, Narcolepsy, Circadian rhythm disorders and the so-called Parasomnias - sleep-walking and night terrors. Mental health also can have a huge impact on the quality of sleep. The list of problems associated with poor sleep is so extensive nowadays that Sleep Medicine is an area of recognised medical specialisation. There is much that can be done to treat poor sleep, but there is also still much to learn.

Wishing you all a restful and relaxed holiday season - and if you do happen to come across St Nick perhaps suggest can he keep his clattering sleigh down to a soporific tinkle instead!

Redesdale Precinct Project Update and Feedback request by 23rd December 2018

Following the last Listening Post held in June at Redesdale Hall, the project architect has been working within the controls of financial viability, practicality and compliancy to accommodate as many of the great suggestions made as possible. The local working group met recently to review the concept plans and consensus was that they looked great. Please find the sketches below and look for larger printed format versions around the community in the hall, pub, cafe, petrol station and community message board to get a better idea of what's planned.

The hall is going to look fabulous with the front facade having local stone and once the new kitchen is in we will have a much improved facility for the community to utilise with more storage and flexible layout at the rear. The tenancy space has been tweaked to provide better privacy and the meeting room is a flexible space with the sink and windows more appropriately placed. The travellers rest has been refined with power and water supplied to the sites and the waste dump point relocated to a more suitable location. Potentially a shower could be added to the existing toilets offering more flexible use for travellers, reserve users including the CFA should we have a major event.

As outlined above there will be larger printed versions of these drawings around the community and available on the redesdale.net website for feedback.

The council has requested written feedback from the community for these concept plans, to ensure they have not missed anything major from the information collected at the Listening Post. I have volunteered to collate these on behalf of the community and share them with council.

Once this review process is completed, the next stage is to move into detailed design stage. This stage of the project will need to receive new funding from council in the 2019/2020 budget.

On behalf of the Precinct Design group I would like to wish you, your family and friends a safe and happy festive season. We look forward to the next stage of the Redesdale Precinct planning process and will be in touch in.

Dear Editors

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to respond to James Turner's letter in response to my October article about collecting honey bee swarms.

In fact, James' suggestion that I said that you need a pest exterminator to remove a swarm of bees from under weatherboards or in a tree is incorrect. I actually said that you need a pest exterminator to remove an established hive or colony from under weatherboards or from a tree. Swarms and established colonies are two very different propositions.

A swarm – that is, bees out in the open - has slimmed down the Queen so she can fly; they are looking for a new abode and so are grateful if a beekeeper supplies a handy, home-like box for them to live in; and the only honey they have with them is in the bellies of the bees.

By contrast, a hive is a colony of bees' established home and they don't take kindly to having their home pulled apart. They are not thinking about relocation and resent attempts by the beekeeper to enforce it. In addition, the Queen can be next to impossible to locate in naturally built honeycomb and without the Queen, the colony will die. Furthermore when you try to re-locate the honeycomb to the new box, it is impossible to avoid breaking some of the cell walls and honey flows out and drowns the bees. Almost inevitably you end up with a terrible mess of dead bees and honey and the surviving bees are angry and prepared to attack any human in the vicinity.

I was trying to convey in my BC article that Win is happy to come and capture swarms – ie bees on the move. But our experience is that many people think "Ah, here is an opportunity to get rid of those bees living in the walls of the laundry / in that tree close to the house." And I was trying to make the distinction between swarm and established colony so that potential callers don't waste our time and theirs by asking Win to come and remove an established colony.

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Please contact the Treasurer on: (03) 5425 3262 OR email bridgeconnection.editor@gmail.com When I spoke to Daniel of Castlemaine Bee Sanctuary recently to ascertain whether he had any techniques that we don't know of for removing established colonies, he told me that his success rate at removing established colonies is only about 50%, and that, in his experience, relocated colonies very seldom thrive. He said he tries to persuade people with unwanted colonies to learn to live with them rather than have him try to relocate them.

And I guess that is where a philosophical difference makes itself apparent between those who are aware of the damage "wild" colonies of honey bees (which could harbour disease and likely will give off several swarms each season) can do to the natural environment and those who not want to kill bees under any circumstances. We belong to the former group, and I imagine, James, you belong to the latter. If that is the case, like beef farmers and vegans, we are never going to agree, but should retain respect for the other's viewpoint.

In relation to your suggestion that my saying that established colonies of wild honey bees should be disposed of is contributing to the current decline of bee populations, I would suggest that globally there are far more powerful and pervasive causes of bee decline. These include: the use of ever more potent poisons in the environment; the international spread of bee parasites and diseases; and the factory farming of bees without due regard for their natural processes.

Just to clarify: I nowhere suggested in my article that beekeepers want to be paid for capturing a swarm. Win certainly doesn't. James is quite right when he points out that a beekeeper is delighted to have a new body of bees to add to his "stock". And those beekeepers with an awareness of indigenous ecosystems will be relieved to have removed wild honeybees from the wild (where they do damage) to farmed (where they provide pollination services and honey, wax and other products for human consumption).
