

Since joining the committee in 2010 she came at a time when the BC was in a very healthy position thanks to Brett and Bernie Campbell, both of whom had put in an enormous amount of work in establishing the paper. Bernie's efforts to seek out advertisers was legendary, so that when the Campbells left, the paper's balance sheet was remarkably secure.

One cannot understate what a huge undertaking this turned out to be, and the polished product that our readers now receive is due to their amazing persistence and acquired skills.

Since Kathy and Regina established themselves as joint editors the paper has regained its financial stability in the

capable hands of Treasurer Terry MacKenzie. However the layout, size and colour of the product is due to Kathy and Regina who shared the editing on alternative months.

As a committee member Kathy's role was invaluable. She is an "ideas" person but prepared to do the hard work which usually accompanies such thought bubbles. With time she was able to develop a wide network, from which the paper and the wider community too, has benefitted. This property is owned by two Melbourne professionals who have run the vineyard for the past 9 years. The vineyard had already been established when they took over ownership making the vines now over 23 years old. Shiraz is the predominant grape variety.

Due to an increased professional workload and circumstances the owners are not in a position to maintain the vineyard over the foreseeable future. They love the idyllic property and vistas and also run cattle. They will continue to do this but are looking for someone with passion and understanding to maintain and improve the vineyard overtime. Hence they are looking for expressions of interest for someone to extend their own vineyard or for someone to fulfil a dream without the capital outlay required for this enterprise.

This southern Heathcote vineyard is well established. It comprises 2500 vines made up of Shiraz, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Grenache vines.

Well maintained by an experienced vineyard manager the fruit and yield continues to develop.

The fruit is currently purchased by several winemakers, one of whom has this wine sold in the iconic restaurant — Rockpool. The vineyard is split into two distinct blocks.

Nestled on the granite soil the property runs alongside the Campaspe River. There is a substantial dam and the property also has drawing rights from the river.



Information for livestock owners -

lead poisoning

Do you know what is laying on your property which could be toxic to your livestock?

Perhaps you have a farm rubbish tip or a shed with forgotten unlabelled products?

Something as simple as a discarded lead battery can lead to the death of some livestock and the contamination of others.

Cattle, in particular, are adept at finding sources of lead poisoning such as old batteries, flaking lead paint, sump oil, and just about any other potential source.

Often the first sign of lead poisoning is finding dead livestock. Where affected animals are observed they show signs of central nervous system damage such as blindness, dullness and other nervous signs.

Removing the source of lead is the best cure.

However, this doesn't help those livestock that are clinically affected for whom the prognosis is poor. Livestock are curious creatures and can be expert at finding lead, so check for possible problems, particularly before putting stock onto new country.

When checking for lead poisoning hazards, consider other potential livestock poisoning risks.

Take into consideration fencing-off all old and existing rubbish tips, this will ensure livestock cannot graze in these areas.

For further advice contact your local veterinarian or an Agriculture Victoria veterinary or animal health officer, or in NSW your Local Land Services.

Fox and wild dog bounty

The Victorian Government's fox and wild dog bounty has resumed and will continue in the North-West and North-East regions until October.

Eligible participants can submit entire fox scalps for a \$10 reward during scheduled collection times.








The average yearly rainfall for Redesdale is about 601mms.

HEALTHY HEART OF VICTORIA 2019 ACTIVE LIVING CENSUS COMINGIN MAY!

Mayors and Chief Executive Officers from the City of Greater Bendigo and the Shires of Campaspe,

Loddon, Mount Alexander, Macedon Ranges and Central Goldfields came together in Bendigo on

Wednesday April 24 to launch the Healthy Heart of Victoria 2019 Active Living Census.

The census, which can be filled out online at www.srcentre.com.au/ ALC from May 20 until June 16,

will also be delivered to more than 117,000 homes in the Loddon Campaspe region in late May.

The City of Greater Bendigo was the first Australian Council to undertake an Active Living Census

in 2014, which was completed by an impressive 16% of the population.

Importantly it provided hard data that helped secure funding for a

range of major recreational and

health and wellbeing projects including local walking trails, water fountains and local health

improvement programs. It also helped other agencies and organisations to make decisions based on

what the community said they wanted

Macedon Ranges Shire Council Mayor, Cr Janet Pearce said the Loddon Campaspe region had some

of the worst health outcomes in Victoria with higher rates of smoking and poorer diet behaviours

than other parts of the state, and the aim of the census is to seek valid local and regional level data

on the community's health behaviours, activity levels, preferences and needs.

"Our region has high levels of heart disease, obesity and cancers, and living a healthier lifestyle can

help prevent this," Cr Pearce said.

"People can be active in lots of different ways. It's not just about those who participate in organised

sport. Through the census we want to find out what people do to stay active, what stops them

from being active and what would it take for them to become more active.

"The findings from the census will be used to produce an overarching report for the Loddon

Campaspe Region and individual reports that are unique to each of the six local government areas.

"No other region in Australia will have this type of data therefore it will put Loddon Campaspe in a

powerful position to advocate for the region's needs. It will be a powerful tool for supporting

projects that provide better future outcomes and help drive ongoing change in our region.

"It's an exciting initiative for our region because it will help local Councils, health agencies, sporting

clubs and government departments to better plan, develop and enhance recreational facilities and

health promotion services to improve the future health and wellbeing of our local communities.

"In Macedon Ranges alone there are many sporting and recreational clubs as well as activity groups,

which include everything from walking, running and cycling groups to equine clubs to dancing groups

for all abilities.

"I encourage all residents to take the time to fill out the Healthy Heart of Victoria 2019 Active Living

Census.

The Healthy Heart of Victoria 2019 Active Living Census will be backed by an extensive marketing

campaign.

In addition a total of \$12,000 in prizes is up for grabs for those who complete the census with extra

incentives provided for those who complete it online. Prizes include gift cards and sporting

equipment.

The 2019 census is being funded by Healthy Heart of Victoria, an initiative of the Loddon Campaspe

Regional Partnership that aims to improve health outcomes for residents living in Central Victoria.

Devenish triumphs as final silo is revealed

Devenish's latest work of art was unveiled at the weekend, before a packed ANZAC Day commemorative service.

Member for Euroa Steph Ryan officially opened painting of a Lighthorse soldier and his horse.

The work was created by Melbourne-based street artist Cam Scale on the side of the town's steel grain silo, next to last year's painting of two army nurses - one from World War I and the other from the modern day.

An estimated 2000 people attended the event, lining the streets for a 1920s themed parade, led by three local veterans Andrew Woods, Tom Trewin and Jarrod Lidgerwood.

Ms Ryan said the placement of the paintings on the town's grain silos, located on the railway line, was very poignant.

"In 1919, Devenish families, like families from all over Australia, were waiting for their loved ones to return from the war," Ms Ryan said.

"Fifty young men enlisted to fight from a population of just 300.

"While the silos weren't built then, the families of those young men waited in the same spot 100 years ago for the train to arrive. For some, it never came."

Ms Ryan said what the Devenish community had achieved, led by Kevin Mitchell and the Devenish Silo Art Committee, was extraordinary.

"The community estimates 75,000 people have visited the town since the murals of the two nurses was finished 12 months ago," Ms Ryan said.

"They had no assistance from the state government and raised almost all of the money to complete the project locally.

"Devenish is an amazing small community which has proudly carved its own future and they should be congratulated for that," Ms Ryan said.

SafeTALK is a half-day alertness workshop that prepares any 18+ adult, regardless of prior experience or training, to become a suicide-alert helper.



As you may be aware there has been ongoing planning and discussion with the City of Greater Bendigo and interested community groups (including the RRRC, Hall Committee and RaDA) regarding the Redesdale Community Precinct Project. Concept plans have been displayed for several months around the town and on the www.redesdale.net web site.



BRIDGE GARDEN PATCH CONNECTION

Redesdale Ramblings:

Is it really autumn?

One of the attractions of this property when we bought it was a working bore which seemed to be an endless supply of water for the garden. Then we went through the longest drought and the water table dropped so low that the bore went dry and the pump burned out!

We eventually got another bore drilled and we took the advice of Tolley's Pumps to use a smaller in-ground pump to fill the large tank and then use another pump to water the garden. Because the tank is at the highest point of our garden we actually could use gravity to water most of the plants.

This year has been so dry that we have been watering continually which is to be expected for things like vegies and fruit trees. But we've had to start watering areas devoted to bulbs! This seems to have helped getting the autumn bulbs to flower better and it should be helping the spring bulbs to start developing their root systems in preparation for flowering after the winter.

I certainly hope that this season is just an aberration and that we return to a more "normal" weather pattern with rain coming through the autumn and into the winter. However we are remodelling parts of the garden to make them more sustainable. We're nowadays advised to group plants of similar water needs together so that we don't waste water on plants that don't need it and can satisfy the needs of more thirsty plants without drowning their

neighbours. So we've concentrated perennials that need summer watering in certain areas and planting a lot of bulbs around deciduous trees which shouldn't need much water once they are established.

Our climate not only suits most Mediterranean bulbs but also ones from similar regions such as the western Cape of South Africa or California and parts of Argentina. So to the daffodils, tulips, irises, anemones and grape hyacinths we can add gladiolus, freesia, sparaxis, albuca, hesperatha, calochortus, brodiaea, dichelostemma and triteleia.

Usually I'd recommend planting these in March or April but with the dry conditions continuing for so long unless you are prepared to water it's probably safe to keep planting as late as May in the hope that the rain will eventuate!

So you might still be able to buy dry bulbs but check them to be sure that they are still firm and haven't developed any soft or rotten areas. It may be too late to get any from the mail order companies but check out the local nurseries such as The Garden Tap in Kyneton or Collectaflora in Woodend. Specialist bulb sellers will have some of the more unusual bulbs and it's worth searching for them at events like the Plantlovers Fair held at Bolobek in Macedon in spring or in the classified section of gardening magazines (at least that's where I used to find them). Just be wary of eBay though because a lot of the sellers are overseas and won't be able to send live bulbs here without going through Quarantine which can be extremely costly!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH 41 Eggplant Polpette



Eggplant 1kg
Breadcrumbs 150g
Parmigiano cheese grated 120g
Eggs 2
Garlic 1 clove chopped
Salt, pepper
Parsley chopped ½ cup
Grated zest of 1 lemon
Vegetable Oil for frying

Makes 30

(I use olive oil but any vegetable oil is fine)
For coating

2 eggs beaten, plain flour and breadcrumbs Method

*Wash and dry eggplants, cut them in half and place them on a tray lined with baking paper

- *Cook eggplants at 200 C for 50-100 minutes depending on the size
- *Once cooked and cooled remove the skin and place the fleshy centre into a colander to drain excess water (ideally overnight)
- *Add the breadcrumbs, cheese and lemon zest season to taste and add the parsley
- *Mix well if the mix is too soggy add more breadcrumbs
- *Using damp hands roll the mixture into even sized balls
- *prepare 3 bowls, one with flour, one with beaten eggs and the other with the breadcrumbs. Roll the Polpette in that order
- *Fry for 2 to 3 minutes till golden and serve The Polpette can be baked but they will tend to lose their shape.

Let the sun shine ...

Around about this time of year I think we all become aware that the number of hours of daylight in the day seem to suddenly decrease, particularly as daylight saving ends, the weather starts to cool down and we naturally spend more time indoors. Obviously this is more of a phenomenon in our southern states than in banana-bending climates. And if you're of that demographic that is lucky enough to be able to relocate regularly to sunnier parts of the country in winter then you can stop reading now. I think the nomadic lifestyle is very befitting of our biology.

For the rest of us, juggling domestic duties and work commitments interjected by long hours of darkness, the change of seasons has material effects on our bodies in subtle ways and one of these effects concerns vitamin D.

Vitamin D is actually a hormone. It is not quite like other vitamins which assist with metabolic processes. It is produced in precursor form through the action of sunlight on the skin. This precursor is modified in the kidneys into the active form of vitamin d, which then is circulated around the body to perform its various biological functions.

Its most well known role is in maintaining good bone health. It assists in the absorption of calcium from the bowel and with depositing calcium into bone. In this way it promotes bone strength and density.

Doctors working amongst northern european populations have always been aware of the risks of low vitamin d to bone development. It causes a condition called Rickets in children which is typified by "bandy" legs - softened bones causes bowing of the long bones. The remedy in years gone by was a regular dose of cod liver oil - being relatively high naturally in vitamin d. Rickets still occurs - rarely - in northern europeans though public health measures have significantly decreased its prevalence.

Vitamin D has other functions which are less well understood, but of equal importance. It certainly appears to have a significant effect on immune function. There are many observational studies which show a correlation between low vitamin d levels and increased infections, colds and flus. There is some evidence to suggest also that supplementation of vitamin d can reduce infections in susceptible people such as those with chronic lung

conditions.

Another interesting area of further investigation concerns vitamin d and nerve function and mood. Depression is a common condition, and has multiple contributing causes. One of the contributors to depression may be low vitamin d. Indeed it is postulated that low vitamin d also contributes to seasonal affective disorder, though I think that cold and grey weather often equates to feeling "low" in any case! Nevertheless, controlled trials in some instances indicate that vitamin d supplementation improves mood and helps control depression.

There is also evidence linking bone pain, back pain and muscle pain with low vitamin d. We know that vitamin d deficiency is more common in elderly people and that the elderly are more prone to falls, muscle weakness or fatigue and chronic pain. It is still uncertain exactly how vitamin d might improve muscular strength and movement, but again there is good evidence that treating vitamin d deficiency can improve muscular function.

Can you have too much vitamin d? Of course - but I have never seen it - even in people taking a regular supplement. It is important to know that increasing your exposure to the sun does not increase your natural vitamin d levels in a linear way - there is a sunlight dose beyond which your skin does not make more vitamin d and which only increases your risk of skin cancers. Taking a supplement particularly in winter can be an effective way of normalising vitamin d levels in the body.

So as we progress into the darker side of the year, have a thought about vitamin d - it is the sunshine hormone we all need.

Mia Mia Local Identity Celebrates Her 95th Birthday



Joan Hindle, a Mia Mia local farmer for many years, celebrated her 95th birthday On Saturday 30th March 2019

A birthday gathering was celebrated at RM Begg Kyneton Aged Care

Joan, born in Heathcote, lived most of her life in Spring Plains/ Mia Mia. With no school close to their farm, Joan's mother taught her using correspondence lessons until she was nine years old. Joan then rode her grey pony Dolly to the Mia Mia School, about 5 miles away, for about twelve months. When the local parents of school children in Spring Plains decided to apply for a school closer to their farms, the Education Department told them that if the locals organised a building and at least 12 children, then they would supply a teacher. A local farmer offered a building for the school to use, but getting 12 children was not so easy, so they had to 'borrow' some children to make up the numbers. With only ten local children they "borrowed" two from Melbourne. Joan's family boarded a young cousin until the local student numbers reached the required twelve.

From when she was 14 Joan's father was not well. She left school to assist him on the farm. They had sheep with a few milking cows from which they made cream. Joan would rise early to milk the cows. When World War II started she was an unofficial Land Army girl, the name given to those girls who worked on farms so that young men could enlist. Her family transport was horse and gig until they got their first motor car, a Chev ute. Its use was limited as there was petrol rationing throughout the war.

Joan spent all her working life on the Mia Mia farm but still manged to see many parts of the world. After the war she and a Mia Mia friend, Phyllis Marshall, set off to explore countries such as England where they saw the coronation of Queen Elizabeth. In Egypt they had an armed guard escort during a tour of the Suez canal, in Malta she marvelled at the magnificence and opulence of the Churches. She also

travelled to New Zealand, Canada and Israel. When her father died in 1959 she continued to run the family farm. In 1962, she married John Hindle from Strathbogie, but only had seven years with him before his death.

She continued to run the farm until well into her 90's. She was active in several community organisations and was an an active member of the Mia Mia Church, the Mia Mia Country Women's' Association which she served as Secretary, President and Group Secretary. She excelled at several crafts including leather work, knitting, crochet and china painting. Two of her crocheted rugs won the regional competition of the Royal Melbourne Show. She won awards for her sheep and for their wool. She was an enthusiastic assistant at the Mia Mia kite flying days, a major contributor to renovations at the Mia Mia Hall, and a regular exhibitor at the Mia Mia Flower Show as well as judge in some categories.

The block from the Spring Plains station that Joan's father was allocated sits below the original Spring Plains homestead, separated from it by Pohlmans Creek. When the Duigan brothers were testing their plane, they took the plane to the flatter land below the homestead. When the Duigan land was split into soldier settler allotments the Pigdon family was allocated the land on which the plane was tested.


