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

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Landcare Activity News from Campaspe Valley Landcare

Your local Landcare group has had a very active planting season. Our activities have stretched from the Mia Mia side of the bridge over the Campaspe to plantings near the Langley School. You can easily see our footprint (the tree guards, if not yet the enclosed trees) in a number of local sites –

- Mia Mia side of the bridge Many shrubs and small trees (the latter higher on the road cutting) planted in an otherwize bare roadside patch, after spraying for Gorse & other weeds
- Kyneton-Redesdale Rd, near the quarry turnoff About 50 Silver Banksia, a locally rare large shrub to small tree
- Watchbox Rd. A mixture of local species on an otherwize bare roadside
- DELWP block, School Rd. Local shrubs in the old water reserve, taking care to plant shrubs appropriate to the site (eg. tea-trees near the drainage line, Ploughshare Wattles & Hardenbergias near the top of the slope)
- Private plantings A number of private land reforestation sites, either broad scale or as windbreaks We also had a recent successful September monthly meeting when members of the Bendigo Field Nats spoke to us about mammals of our district, including a bundle of skins of native mammals for all to touch, feel & become familiar. The Tuans in particular received a lot of attention and that dovetailed neatly with our current project of constructing nest boxes for these charming small predators.

Our meetings are held on the first Saturday of each month, at 4 pm in Barfold Hall.

Redesdale CFA update

It's that time of the year again ,with longer days and warmer weather, when we start spending our evenings outdoors. By now we probably have fired up the bbg to watch a strong and bold team win the AFL grand final. It's not too late though, we are being advised by the CFA to do our soapy water leak test on gas bottle fittings. This also includes patio heaters, gas powered pizza ovens, cookers etc.

l recently experienced my 9 kg bottle putting more gas into the atmosphere than the bbq. The problem was a perished rubber o ring. This was easily fixed, a couple of dollars buys a packet of 5 which was enough to replace the seals on all of my outdoor appliances. Not a bad idea to do this

regularly.

While on the subject of gas bottles. Your household supply comes with a number of regulations regarding positioning. The bottle is designed to vent when heated up and even if this gas was to ignite, it would burn harmlessly away from the home and eventually burn itself out. Outdoor bbq's don't have the same restrictions. Many smaller bottles are often tucked away in a timber cabinet or sitting on a wooden deck possibly with the vent pointing towards the bouse.

As part of your fire plan I would like to ask that you consider bbq and gas bottle locations. On a bad day, or if you choose to leave, you could relocate gas bottles to a cleared area away from buildings.

This would help us imensly.

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LIBERALS MUST COMMIT TO PRESCHOOL FUNDING

Federal Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters is shining the spotlight on the importance and value of early education, this Early Learning Matters Week.

"Early education is vital because of the proven positive impact it has on the development of children," Chesters said.

"We know that quality learning experiences in the first five years of a child's life play an integral role in their development.

"I'd also like to acknowledge the valuable care and support our early educators provide to families across Central Victoria, including those that are vulnerable and at risk.

Access to affordable preschool and kinder programs should be a priority for any Government. It is fundamental that early education is accessible, affordable and high quality.

Unfortunately, the Liberal Government's attitude to early learning is the complete opposite.

The Liberals refuse to provide long-term funding certainty for four year old preschool and extend the program to three year olds.

"The cost of preschool is already high and the current lack of funding could see centres forced to increase fees or cut hours," Chesters said.

"The uncertainty will also put centres and jobs in the sector at risk.

"The lack of support for preschools by the Liberal Government means families and staff across Bendigo can't plan for the future."

Early Learning Matters Week is a chance for the Liberal Government to make a long term commitment to universal access to preschool.

Families and educators deserve a government that values early education and understands that early learning matters.

Part-time squad not enough to tackle rural crime

Victorian farmers have long called for a dedicated rural crime squad, but today's announcement doesn't deliver what farmers requested.

Changing job titles is not the same as adding new frontline officers and it won't help tackle worsening rural crime rates.

The Andrews Labor Government is trying to dress today's announcement up as 70 new positions, but in reality there won't be any more boots on the ground in frontline roles to protect our farmers and their properties.


Without a commitment from the Government for new frontline roles and a dedicated, specialist rural crime unit, this is just Labor shuffling the deck chairs.

Victoria's existing Agricultural Liaison Officers (AGLOs) do the best they can to tackle rural crime but they need more support.

Just 12 months ago Labor was rubbishing the idea of a dedicated rural crime squad and it's clear they still aren't listening.

The devil's always in the detail with Daniel Andrews and once you look closely at this announcement it falls well short of what our farmers have been calling for

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Rogue animal activists to cop new sanctions

Animal activists invading people's properties can expect to face tough new sanctions after new farm trespass laws passed the Federal Parliament last Friday.

The news comes as a Victorian Parliamentary committee investigating the issue prepares to hold a hearing in Wangaratta next month.

Member for Euroa and Deputy Leader of The Nationals Steph Ryan said the Federal Nationals had driven the changes to Commonwealth law, which will introduces new offences for incitement of trespass, property damage and theft on agricultural land.

"This legislation is a huge win for farmers, their families and regional communities not only in Victoria, but Australia-wide," Ms Ryan said.

"It sends a clear message to animal activists that violating the personal information of farmers, including the publication of their addresses to incite trespass, will not be tolerated.

"Activists will now risk imprisonment of up to five years if they are found to have breached the privacy of farmers and their families.

"If you trespass and steal livestock from farming families and their businesses, you are not an activist, you're a criminal and you deserve to be punished for your actions."

Ms Ryan said The Nationals had also been working in the Victorian Parliament to bring about changes to protect farming families from rogue animal activists.

The Victorian Parliament is holding public hearings to gather evidence from farmers on how the actions of animal activists are impacting their businesses and their livelihoods.

Ms Ryan is encouraging anyone affected by rogue animal activists to consider giving evidence to the committee.

"The committee has so far received almost 500 submissions to the inquiry.

"I am pleased that the committee has scheduled a public hearing to be held Wangaratta next month.

"I strongly encourage anyone in our region who has been impacted by animal activists to consider giving evidence at the hearing.

"It is critically important that the committee receives the evidence it needs to make strong recommendations for greater legal protection."

Labor flags desal plan expansion

Water Minister Lisa Neville has announced plans to make Melbourne's expensive desalination plant even bigger today, while doubling down on Labor's no dams policy.

Minister Neville's comments again prove how short-sighted the Andrews Labor Government is when it comes to planning for Victoria's future water needs.

Comment attributable to Shadow Minister for Water Steph Ryan

The desal plant is lazy, expensive infrastructure and making it bigger and even more expensive is a lazy approach. It will drive up water bills again when we know families are already really hurting with cost of living pressures.

The Andrews Government is failing to look at better options, like stormwater and rainwater harvest systems and recycled water projects.

These projects are smart infrastructure because they are generally localised, less expensive and less energy-intensive and they produce high quality water for things like watering parks and gardens and flushing toilets, while taking pressure off drinking water supplies.

The last resort should be panic-ordering another desal unit when there are better, smarter options out there.

Labor's anti-dams stance is also so short-sighted.

Climate change is driving more extreme storm events and longer dry periods which increases the importance of investing in water capture and storage like dams to ensure reliable water supply.

Labor is so city-centric they think an extra desal unit for Melbourne is somehow going to help farmers and communities in other parts of the state where new dams should definitely be investigated.



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Campaspe Crisis Continues

Sept. 16th saw the Deputy Leader of the Nationals Steph Ryan visit to launch a community petition calling on the Legislative Assembly to demand that the State Government upgrade the Kyneton Water Reclamation Plant to facilitate the production of Class B water only. This will hopefully help to ensure the funding for works that Coliban Water urgently need to undertake at the KWRP, so if you see the petition please add your support. Copies are available.

From the EPA website: Unfortunately no local news or updates there as yet. We are keen to see the results of the investigations on Snipes Creek and the Campaspe undertaken by the EPA.

Sept. 18th: "Charter of Consultation open for comment ... To have your say and shape the future of environmental engagement in Victoria, visit https://engage.vic.gov. au/epa-charter-consultation ." This may be one way of stating categorically that data used in licencing the authorities responsible for our water must be reliable and relevant. E.g. the use of medians or annual averages must have checks and balances in place to ensure that they do not provide loop holes for entities to meet their licence requirements but still contaminate the waterways from time to time. It only takes one strong dose of poison to compromise and our river was severely compromised for weeks and weeks this year.

NB If you want to be notified of contaminating releases and haven't yet been in contact with Coliban Water, please ring them on 1300 363 200 to register.

Your choice of email or phone text but please also request that the Vic Emergency App is an option as well as this would alert not only locals, but let the many visitors to our area have the information they need to stay safe.








BRIDGE GARDEN PATCH CONNECTION

Redesdale Ramblings:

Anemones for when the wind blows and the sun shines.

When I first saw the word I thought it was pronounced "an-e-mo-ne" but my older sister laughed and corrected me "an-nem-mon-nee" which when said quickly sounds like "an-enemy"! Which led to the pun "with fronds like these who needs anemones" uttered by the lady who got given a fern instead of her favourite flowers! Funnily enough many years later I discovered that some Europeans pronounce it the way that I had in my youth!

The first type of anemone I knew of was the "Japanese Windflower", Anemone japonica (now considered a form of Anemone vitifolia) which grew rampantly through part of the garden of my childhood home. This was probably 'Honorine Jobert' with pure white poppy-like flowers in late summer followed by fluffy cotton-like seed-heads. There are now a few different forms available including single, double, white, pink or deep pink. They are perennial plants which spread by underground shoots and prefer heavy soil in partial shade and are great as a tall ground-cover under deciduous trees. Anyone who has seen the avenue of pears at Lambley Nursery under-planted with these would immediately want to recreate it at home.

Much smaller than these (and only suited to cool conditions with soil which never dries out completely) are the "wood anemones", Anemone nemorosa, which are spring ephemerals with blue, pink, white and bicolored flowers growing from wiry rhizomes that can spread quickly in the right conditions. Anemone ranuculoides is similar but in bright yellow; the hybrid between the two is Anemone x lipsiensis with paler, lemony blooms.

In between in size are the Mediterranean wind-flowers, Anemone pavonina, A. heldreichii and A. coronaria (hybrids between these are sold as "St Brigid's" or "de Caen" varieties and are commonly seen in shops are dry tubers each autumn). Anemone coronaria is usually the first to bloom in our rock garden in the late winter. Ours were grown from seed labelled "from Iraq"! The first ones were either purple or white but recently pinky-purple ones have appeared, obviously crosses

of the two original ones. This year we got flowers of ceriseypink on some grown from seed from "Seeds of Peace" in Israel. In the wild they can be a range of colours from pure white to blood red and the finely cut foliage has been likened to parsley – just don't add it to your salad!

The best display of Anemone pavonina I've seen in cultivation was at Ashwood Nursery in the West Midlands, UK, created by John Massey. The embankment opposite the shop entrance was a mass of this Anemone in shades of pink, red and white. A dozen years ago we got some different anemone species and introduced them to the rock garden and now we have seedlings popping up around this bed reminiscent of what we saw at Ashwoods. So far the colours have mostly been soft pink, bright red or cream with a reddish exterior. I've heard that these can be an incredible sight in Olive Groves in the Mediterranean region and would love to see them growing in the wild.

Anemone heldreichii is the smallest of this trio and the form we got came from Marcus Harvey whose "Hillveiw Rare Plant Nursery" sold many wonderful bulbs and other geophytes, some of which he grew from seeds he'd collected himself in places such as Greece and Turkey. Sadly he's no longer with us and I can't confirm that with him. This sweet little windflower opens from greyish mauve buds to brilliant white with dark centres. Last year a seedling came into flower which was pink and had slightly wider petals. I presume that it was a hybrid with Anemone pavonina which flowers at about the same time – I was very pleased to see it return this spring.

These three are well suited to conditions in Central Victoria as they come into leaf when the autumn rain comes, grow through the winter and flower in spring, dying down as the weather warms up to disappear without a trace by summer. If you leave the seed-heads to form they will puff-up nicely then slowly disintegrate into wisps of cotton-wool which will settle to the ground close by, germinating in autumn. They take a year or two to reach flowering size but each year they will reappear and surprise you with their cheerful faces.



1 kg mussels

1 glass white wine

2 tbls olive oil

1 onion, finely chopped

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

1/2 teaspoon dried chilli flakes (optional)



Acid burns

Nothing ruins the memory of an indulgent dinner like the pain of heartburn at 3 am in the morning. Gastrooesophageal reflux has many names, but call it what you will, it can be severely painful, and should never be ignored.

After food is chewed, it is propelled by the muscular gullet, or oesophagus, into the stomach. Gravity helps it into place too.

The presence of food in the stomach then stimulates a variety of events in the stomach which prepare the body for the process of digestion. One of the important functions of the stomach is to produce acid. It is amazing to think that the stomach can produce acid as strong as car battery acid without destroying itself in the process. Stomach acid helps to sterilise food before it enters the rest of the digestive tract, and also triggers enzymatic digestion of food.

Today's carefully prepared diet rarely presents much of an infection risk. On the other hand, digestion is sometimes more difficult through processing and cooking. The process of heating makes some foods, meat for example, less digestible. Good reason to have your steak rare instead of well done!

Reflux of stomach acid into the gullet is much more likely to occur where food sits in the stomach a long time, so it really is important that your food digests quickly. So overcooked food is associated with reflux. Too much alcohol, caffeine, salt, fat or sugar with your meal also delays digestion and can lead to reflux.

Reflux happens simply when acid in the stomach is pushed up into the oesophagus. This is promoted by any contraction of abdominal muscles such as happens with lifting, or if you are lying down, so that gravity no longer acts to keep stomach fluid in the stomach. The lining of the oesophagus is unable to protect itself from the effects of the acid and a burn is created. If the burn is severe enough it will take days or even weeks to completely heal.

Apart from the pain or discomfort caused by reflux, there are other potentially longer lasting problems associated with reflux. Where reflux occurs over a long time, repeated burning of the oesophagus can cause scarring or stricture. The effect of this is to make movement of food into the stomach more difficult.

Another problem occurs when repeated exposure to acid causes change in the cells lining the oesophagus. This is called Barrett's oesophagus. It is a pre-cancerous change which needs to be regularly monitored much like you would monitor sun-damaged skin for signs of skin cancer.

So reflux is potentially a very serious problem. Thankfully most of the time it is infrequent and easy to manage. At 3

am in the morning you can use anything alkaline to help reduce the acid pain - Soda water is effective but antacids are an obvious option as well. Sitting upright is important because reflux can sometimes happen repeatedly over a night, and sitting helps prevent that.

If reflux is happening repeatedly night after night, it is worth thinking about dietary issues. Is it possible to change the diet to make your digestion work better? If a change of diet is not working then it is definitely worth a visit to the doctor to discuss medication to manage the reflux. At this stage it is important to ensure that the discomfort you suffer really is reflux and not something else. Medication will also generally vastly improve reflux symptoms, making a good night's sleep possible again!

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

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
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
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
