

Flying Doctor Community Transport Expands in Heathcote

The addition of a new vehicle to the Royal Flying Doctor Service's (RFDS) Community Transport fleet will mean greater capacity for the program, which is run in partnership with Heathcote Health.

The free service provides eligible community members living within 30km of Heathcote with free transport to health care appointments and planned activity groups within a 50km radius of town. The cars are driven by local volunteers and the service is coordinated locally, using RFDS transport scheduling software.

Previously, there had been two vehicles in operation but, with both vehicles regularly booked to capacity, the addition of a third was required.

"The RFDS Community Transport service has surpassed expectations, with more than 4,000 transports taking place since the program began in mid-2018 and an average of 17 trips per day," says Dr Melanie Trivett, RFDS Victoria General Manager, Primary Health Care.

"The addition of the new vehicle allows us to be responsive to the Heathcote community's transport needs by increasing service capacity and helping those who don't have access to suitable transport – something that, for so many, can severely limit their access to health care and vital social connection." More than 390 clients are currently registered with the service. The new vehicle will assist in servicing the demand of those currently registered, while also providing capacity for more eligible users to join. The most common trips are to specialists, hydrotherapy, cancer treatment, physiotherapy and GP appointments, with Bendigo a common destination. Passengers are able travel with up to two family members or carers with them, and wheelchairs, walking frames, and mobility scooters can be accommodated.

Residents can enquire about their eligibility for the service by calling 1300 887 678. Once their eligibility is confirmed, bookings can also be made by calling 1300 887 678.

Stinson Memorial Committee update 4

Positive news is great news! In mid November, I asked Ian "Macca" Mc Namara host of ABC radio's Australia All Over to help us find the relatives of air crash victims Peter and Kevin Lawn and First Officer Orvil Darcy Openshaw.

Lawn and First Officer Orvil Darcy Openshaw. Within minutes a lady from Kerang rang to let me know that she knew of a family called Lawn and would contact them on my behalf. Ten minutes later I was talking to Bruce Lawn, brother of Peter and Kevin and he was very pleased to know of our project. I must say, after having rung so many phone numbers of people with the name Lawn and Keleher trying to find them, I felt very pleased and a bit emotional. Bruce and his brother Murray are keen to attend the memorial's dedication in January. They have visited the area once before with their father decades ago when they were boys. Anton Hassel attended a special meeting to discuss the text, composition, and construction of the storyboard. In brief there will be a series of text blocks describing the Tragedy, the Plane, the Passengers and Crew, the People of the District and the Outcome. The final panel will recognise significant

contributors. Pictures will not be part of the panel but rather two tone laser cut graphics in stainless steel. It is anticipated the storyboard will be approximately 1.8m X 0.9m.

The program has not been completely finalised but we expect to start at 9.30 am and finish before 11am at the Memorial site. Colin Smith has organised the formation fly over salute by the Kyneton Aero Club which will take place at 9.55am followed by the wreath laying by the Kyneton RSL and the kin of the victims.

The Kyneton RSL has donated \$750 to the memorial project and a big thank you to their Committee and members for this donation.

Howard Nathan and Graham Cooper have also given generous donations.

The Stinson Memorial Committee invites the communities of our district to attend the dedication ceremony on the **31st of January 2020** at 9.30 am at the memorial site on the Burke & Wills Track near the Duigan Monument.

Bring a hat and a folding chair as seating may be limited. Refreshments will be available at the Mia Mia Hall in Valley Road after the dedication. There will also be a display of photos, news cuttings and any items of interest. If anyone has any relevant items we would love to include them. We have invited the Kyneton Air Cadets to be the honour guard and place the flags.



CRYPTIC CLUES



We have recently been handed some stats ,from the fire and incident reporting service, that show how often,when and why we turn out. Along with our historical data we are able to piece together the most likely turn out scenario.

December is our busiest month and not surprising grass fires are the biggest reason for us having to respond. Our stats show that we are most likely to be called to a grass fire, started by someone mowing or slashing dry grass at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and the person will not have the minimum 10 litres of water with them.

To avoid being that person standing next to their grass cutting implement with a sheepish look on their face, there are a few simple steps to take.

Firstly and ideally all of your fire preparation work should have been done by now. Don't mow dry grass.

Secondly, finish up by midday. If you have to operate in dry grass then do it early while the temperature and wind speed are down and there's still some moisture in the air.

And lastly, carry a knapsack, extinguisher, garden sprayer or something that holds a minimum of 10 litres. Some large fires could have been easily stopped while they were just an ember on the ground.

On a separate note, it has been a horrific start to summer in the Northern states. I am hoping that this doesn't flow on to our region .Fingers crossed for cool conditions and even some rain!

Redesdale Ramblings

Redesdale Ramblings # 10: Annuals for Bulbs

As we head into summer we're watching where we have to water. When we renovated some of the garden beds in the front yard we positioned some deciduous trees through one area and underplanted with a variety of bulbs, from daffodils and tulips to freesias and moraeas . These have provided greenery and flowers through the winter and into the spring but have now started to die down. During the winter we had sown seeds and planted seedlings of poppies, stocks and honeywort in the same area. Where there weren't many bulbs these will provide interest into the summer as long as we can provide a bit of water. Where there are bulbs we won't irrigate except to "spot water" the newly planted trees by trickling the hose on them; once these are established they should be able to get through the summer without our intervention.

We scattered an entire seed packet of California Poppy (Eschscholzia californica) over one patch in the winter and by October there was a carpet of ferny bluish-green foliage topped with pink, yellow, cream or orange flowers. This packet produced plants with single blooms in mixed colours but there are fancier types with double flowers or are available in separate colours.

The good thing about plants like California poppies is that they can survive and flower on minimal water - though they thrive when you can be generous - and keep flowering if you pick off the spent flowers to prevent seeds forming. This means there is no need to water them when there are bulbs underneath them but if there's an unexpected shower they will use the water which should protect the dormant bulbs from rotting. Other poppies such as the "Flanders" or "Shirley" or "Peony" poppies germinate in autumn or winter and grow with the winter rain to flower in the spring (see last month's article for more details). These can get quite large by the time they dry off in the summer but make sure you allow them to set seed before you pull them out.

Honeywort, Cerinthe major 'Purpurascens', is related to

Borage (and Patterson's Curse!) with glaucous blue-green foliage in a basal has rosette which expands up into a pyramid of leafage bedecked with hanging bells of dark purple peeking out from bracts which can be the colour of a bruise! They add a bit of interest to a mixed bouquet of spring flowers.

When the bells fall the bracts clasp together to hide the developing black seeds. These are relatively large and easy to collect – if you want to – we let them fall where they will but move the seedlings if we want them elsewhere. However they do benefit from being thinned out so that they aren't too crowded. The plants get to about half a metre tall and die off as the seeds ripen so can be removed as they start to look unsightly. The spent plants can be bagged to collect the seeds as they fall or chopped up and scattered wherever you want them to grow the following season.

Other annuals often used with bulbs are forget-me-nots (Myosotis sylvatica), heartsease (Viola tricolor), pansies (Viola x wittrockiana) and wallflowers (Erysimum cheiri) though the last two can survive another year or two, so strictly speaking aren't "annuals"! You often see pics from the UK or Holland where the bulbs and the annuals are flowering together so colour coordinating is very important! The problem I've found with these annuals is that they often take longer to get to flower than the bulbs so they don't actually coincide.

However they are handy at covering the bulb foliage as it dies down. Plus if the bulbs have already faded there's no chance of colour clashes! These also have the benefit (or curse) of self-sowing so the following year you just need to re-distribute the seedlings to where you want them, though often they put themselves exactly where they should be. Larkspurs (Consolida species), Love-in-the-mist (Nigella damascena), Pot-marigolds (Calendula officinalis) also self-sow

and are what I call "perennial annuals" because once you have them seeding around you don't need to buy anymore. Recently we got half a dozen "potted colour" zinnias which we hadn't grown in ages – I hope they add to the continuing range of recurring annuals.

Redesdale District Association Report

JAN SMITH – GIRGARRE; DYNAMIC & PROGRESSIVE

A MUST READ FOR ALL REDESDALE / MIA MIA RESIDENTS

Jan Smith from a small town called Girgarre (approximately 1hr 15mins from Redesdale towards Shepparton), with a population of just 180 residents, was invited by the dedicated and highly motivated RaDA President, Gloria Pocock, to speak to representatives from the community and the three committee's recently at the Redesdale Hotel.

What unfolded over the two hours was nothing short of mindboggling and breath-taking as Jan proceeded to tell us about the incredible successes and achievements their small, yet very, very progressive community has developed and created.

Since the Millenial Drought (approximately 15 years ago), Girgarre struggled as its dairy farming community has reduced its dairy farming economy to 30% of it's former self. With only 3 stores/businesses remaining, the community rallied as one to form a "Development Group'.

After the closure of the Heinz factory in Girgarre in January 2012, the town's major employer, the town was offered \$50k to help build the music festival and the farmers market. Heinz was approached with a community dream – to build a botanical garden. The community requested a parcel of land adjoining our community park to undertake this project – Heinz's response was spectacular- an offer of the 24 acres and its water right as well as 3 house blocks in the town. After a little prompting Heinz also paid for all conveyancing/legal costs for their land transfer.

With the land, the community started a botanical garden project with an estimated cost of \$12m. This was just the start of many projects over a period of 15 years.

By creating a 'one community' approach and vision, Girgarre, has on offer some of the most dynamic and progressive community outcomes that one could ever contemplate from such a small community.

- Their enterprise started with \$700 it's now has an enterprise value of \$1 million
- An open-minded approach to the world has seen an organic milk factory producing butter with stage 2 underway which will manufacture cheese (a \$ 60 -\$80 million project) which will inject 40 -60 jobs into the community make Girgarre home
- Another company is to build a Solar farm, creating 4 8 full-time jobs
- Their farmers, craft, produce market t brings \$50k into the community
- They have a large music festival every year which attracts people Australia wide and includes a 'mini-muster each month and camp-overs raising more funds for the community
- The Girgarre Hall which is their 'hub' has been used over 250 times in one year
- They are one of only two communities Victoria wide that have a self-funded community car with enough funds in the bank for a further two cars

- The Open Garden scheme started with just 2 gardens; it now earns \$8k in one day
- Other farms now moving into the area include goat milk farming; flower farms, camel farms
- Girgarre was awarded one of 6 Small Town Transformation grants Regional Arts Victoria S by RDV of \$ 350,000 which allowed the building of the Sound shell and Amphitheatre – the community put \$ 100,000 toward these costs. Part of the grant was to create an arts program which was facilitated by 3 well known artists (one coming from England) – an ongoing partnership with one of these artists is leading the creation of a sound walk featuring large scale musical instruments made of re-purposed junk and the creation of a unique orchestra
- Their local newspaper is one of 'the best' according to Jan

THEIR GOAL and SECRETS TO THEIR SUCCESS

Was to create a Sustainable Community and work together as one. All residents have skills and talents; they are from all different age brackets and denominations; they enjoy being involved and they all offer to help one another to achieve the best outcome ultimately for the sake of their own community.

They started with small events and grew from there even if it wasn't an immediate hit they kept going building on it each year with feedback and new ideas.

They find solutions to problems; nothing stays the same; you need to be different to keep the town alive and vibrant

They find people to do the work – it may be as small as selling raffle tickets or making cups of tea but involvement on any level is great involvement.

They have a holistic approach to the community; it's not us against them; it's all of the community working together, asking for help and offering help.

Their committee members are not just from Girgarre, but from everywhere with up to 19 reports each month from different committee's/interest groups.

Jan is a gutsy woman who has a 'never say never attitude' and if 'you don't ask you don't get approach. She is funny, interesting, straight up and challenges the status quo; she is totally inspiring.



Preserving the past

Local history grants now available

Euroa MP and Deputy Leader of The Nationals Steph Ryan is encouraging local history groups looking to preserve, record and share their town's history to apply for the Public Record Office Victoria's Local History Grants Program.

Applications are now open for grants of up to \$15,000 to assist local community groups and organisations that collect and preserve the stories of our region.

Ms Ryan said these grants aimed to support local historical groups planning or currently working on projects to secure their stories for generations to come.

"The Euroa electorate has a vibrant history with many important local stories to share for generations to come," Ms Ryan said. Projects previously supported through the program include the digitisation and preservation of newspapers, cataloguing of objects and records, the development and production of exhibitions and the purchase of high standard storage and display cases.

Local recipients from last year's round of grants included the Benalla Aviation Museum Inc., Euroa Historical Genealogical Society, Kilmore Cemetery Trust, Merrigum and District Historical and Education Society Inc. and the Wandong History Group Inc.

Ms Ryan said that the diversity of past successful projects demonstrated how important it is to preserve our local history for future generations to enjoy.







RECIPE OF THE MONTH 48 Glazed Christmas Ham



1 Whole Leg Ham (about 8 kg)

1 cup of apricot jam

3 tablespoons of seeded mustard

Whole cloves to stud

Heat the jam and mustard on the stove till it becomes runny

Preheat the oven to 180C

Use a sharp knife to cut around the shank of the ham, about 10cm from the end.

Place your fingers between the rind and the fat and gently lift the rind of in one piece.

Score the fat in a diamond pattern being careful not to cut through to the meat.

Stud the centres with the whole cloves.

Transfer to a baking dish lined with baking paper.

Brush half of the jam mixture over the ham.

Bake for 30 mins, brushing with jam every 30 mins.

Cook for a total of 1 hour and 30 minutes



Regardless of religious, or irreligious views, Christmas is a very appropriate time in our calendar year to reflect on the importance of the Christmas story. That is, one person was born into this world roughly two thousand years ago, who for all his humanity, managed to significantly promote a philosophy of peace and goodwill to all, that, despite the monstrous contortion that religion has sometimes become, persists to this day.

It is a reminder that the antithèses of peace and goodwill, which are intolerance, injustice, coercion and bullying, are the caustic acts which as individuals, as communities and even as nations, continue to impoverish our potential for happy and healthy life.

How many of us are subjected to bullying? It is a common problem unfortunately that is difficult to quantify. Bullying is behaviour that has the intent to humiliate, dis-empower or demean the targeted individual. Like beauty, it is somewhat in the eye of the beholder. Research in Australian schools suggests as many as one in four children are bullied. Unfortunately bullying is not just limited to children and schools. Workplace bullying is a common problem too. When people are demeaned or humiliated in a sexualised way this becomes sexual harassment. Bullying in a family context equates to family violence.

Bullying, over time, can foster a variety of significant mental health issues. These include Depression, Anxiety, Post traumatic stress, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder and Body Dysmorphic Disorder. Any of these conditions can be absolutely disabling when it comes to participating in work and relationships.

Even when the effects of bullying are less severe, the resulting unhappiness and low self-esteem can contribute to significant under performance at school or work and difficulty with relationships.

There can be long-term negative effects for the perpetrators of bullying too. If bullying behaviour in an individual becomes normal for them, this will affect more and more relationships around them. It can also lead to more extreme anti-social behaviours.

Another response to bullying which is well recognised is when the target of bullying, in a different social context, becomes the perpetrator. This is one way in which bullying behaviour "snowballs" through a community, as the experience of bullying conditions or changes other individuals also to bully. Individuals who are most likely to be bullied are those that "stand out", or have characteristics that set them apart from the group. How should bullying be managed? It is important to understand the context of bullying. It is important to encourage the person who is being bullied to speak up to trusted others in their community. This could involve a conversation with a teacher, parent or work colleague, or a trusted friend can provide significant support. The worst outcomes happen where nothing is said or discussed, and therefore the bullying is allowed to continue. There are a number of strategies which can be used to counteract bullying. These strategies aim to minimise the chance that the bullying behaviour will be reinforced by the reactions of the target. Appropriate reactions can include walking away, pretending indifference, or fostering support from friends.

If teachers or work colleagues or others in authority are aware of bullying, these people can also be effective in challenging bullying when it occurs. In this way pressure is brought upon the bully to change behaviour, and perhaps address underlying causes, with appropriate referral to a Health Practitioner.

Here is to a peaceful Christmas with tolerance and goodwill to all.




