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

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Keith Gale 15th January 1929 - 10th February 2020



Eulogy by Elaine

Keith was born on January 15th, 1929, as Harold Keith Gale, the first son of Harold Thomas and Ena Adeline Gale in Howlong, NSW. Most of his life he was known as Keith.

Keith was an elder brother to Kevin and Mary (who died in May 2017) and was Married to Lois Jean (who died just last month).""

Being the eldest Keith was expected to leave school and get a job as soon as he could to help support the family.

Before leaving the Catholic school in Howlong, Keith completed Class Six & Seven with great results - all 'B's in all 5 subjects in 1941 & 1942 at the age of 13.

Keith was also an altar boy for the Catholic church for some years prior.

Keith's first job was Tilley Plastics in Melbourne, where he completed his Apprenticeship in Fitting & Turning on 18th April 1950. He moved onto his next job at Polson Motor Parts in Footscray, where he eventually meet, Lois Jean and they married on 29th March 1952. Before their marriage, they enjoy dancing, frequently in the company of his brother Kevin and sister-in-law, Beryl.

During his employment at Poison's - Keith and Lois Jean built their first home for the family in Pascoe Vale. Accommodation during construction of the family home was a garage and living with their first child, daughter - Kaye.

Completion of the family home became urgent with the arrival of their second child - son Philip. The garage was becoming too small for 2 adults and 2 children, so the house was soon finished and when Philip was born they moved in.

The following years of 1959 to 1963 -another two children -Elaine and Alison were born and a new job commenced with Caterpillar of Australia in Tullamarine, which was closer to the

family home.

During 1976, Keith completed a course to become a Motor Mechanic for Diesel Engines and he shared many hours teaching Philip about cars and repairing and stripping down an engine and then rebuilding it back to original state of working. Keith's last job before retirement was with Pleasant View in Preston for 13 years.

His role was in General Maintenance for Pleasant View, at the Children's Court, the Smith Street Clinic and "G" Division in Pentridge Jail.

After retirement, the family home was sold in Pascoe Vale and Keith commenced construction of a second home in his lifetime, at his

Property in Mia Mia, with his second wife, Margaret The land where the home was built was purchased in the 70's and there were many visits on weekends to keep the grass short Keith had Highland Cattle on his property as pets and also had a beautiful and loving cat called

Mischief. Throughout his working and private life, he continued his faith in Religion. Living in his new community of Mia Mia and surrounding areas, he continued to be a valued part of his parish and the Community.

Keith was always ready to help, where needed and would be the first to offer his help for any project/ charitable event As well as his religious commitment, he was involved with the local Fire Brigade as a volunteer, he helped with printing and publishing of diaries and assisted with the preparation and delivery of the local publication, The Bridge Connection.

Keith was involved with the Metcalfe Senior Citizens and Redesdale Rebels (i.e. Senior Clubs) and was part of the Macedon Ranges Uniting Church Partnership.

Due to Keith's Voluntary work in the community Keith was awarded a certificate of appreciation in the International Year of Volunteers 2001 signed by the Hon Steve Bracks MP Premier of Victoria.

Keith was the proud father to 4 children, grandfather to 9 Grandchildren and great grandfather to 5 great grandchildren. It is a great shame that he didn't get to meet his 6th great grandchild.

Reflection's of Keith's life by Alison

For as long as I can remember, Dad was always involved in the local church -for the past 30 years the local parishes of Barfold, Metcalfe and Mia Mia and Sutton Grange. Being small communities, numbers were very important to keep them going. For many years, he helped by cutting the grass at Barf old and he hated giving this up in the last couple of years when he could no longer manage. He also enjoyed attending the yearly dance in Redesdale with the Redesdale Revellers in full dance and song. In addition to his church activities, Dad was very active in the wider community including Kyneton University of the 3rd Age, Metcalfe

Senior Citizens and Kyneton Landcare and the Men's Breakfast.

Keith always had a wicked sense of humour and could spin a yarn like a champion. When Alison was in her 20s, Keith and

Margaret (Keith's) second wife) would go caravanning Alison would babysit their house with their 2 cats, Simon and Cleo in Pascoe Vale. One such time it was Valentine's Day and when she arrived to feed Simon and Cleo there was a huge card waiting for her, signed by the little fur critters! It was the paw prints in place of their names that gave her a chuckle, although in hindsight,

Keith should have cleaned their paws after applying the ink, as having their little paw signatures all over the kitchen lino floor in purple ink probably wasn't ideal!



After Keith's melanoma cancer diagnosis in 2012, the subsequent surgery resulted in the loss of his left ear. It was not long after, this that Keith went to the local hardware store to get some bits and pieces. It was a family run business at the time with the owner's 17-year-old son working there. The young man helped Dad find the bits he needed and, after chatting for a little while, the young man said,

"Can I ask you a question?"

Keith responded "of course':

He asked, 'What happened to your ear?"

Quick as a wit, Keith responded, 'A guy said lend me your ear, and the bastard hasn't brought it back."

The young man doubled over with laughter. Then his father arrived to ask what was going on? Somehow, they managed to relay the story in-between fits of laughter, which subsequently had all 3 of them nearly wetting themselves.

Thank you Elaine & Alison for allowing The Bridge Connection the opportunity to reflect on parts of Keith Life.

Keith will be greatly missed by his Family, Friends and the Redesdale Mia Mia and surrounding communities.

As a part of the City of Greater Bendigo's strategy to support rural communities and projects such as our Redesdale Community Hub, I am pleased to confirm that the Agnes Mudford Reserve now has free community Wi-Fi access available for everyone with a phone, tablet or PC with Wi-Fi located in and around the green 'Pavilion' overlooking the Reserve. This is wonderful especially with the challenges we have for internet access in the area. A huge thank you to the City of Greater Bendigo for this support and service.

Please see further details elsewhere in the Bridge Connection, at https://www.bendigo.vic.gov.au/Services/Free-community-wifi and posted around the Redesdale township regarding how to access this new Wi-Fi hotspot. Note that no password is needed, so just connect and go! Range is around 15-20 meters around the Pavilion, (subject to your device and the amount of people accessing the hotspot at the same time). On the front deck of the Pavilion is a great spot out of the weather and a very pleasant place to sit, browse and take in the surrounding sights, sounds and smells of our town.

Once the Pavilion is ready for use, (see RRRC report) we are delighted to advise that the City of Greater Bendigo has provided our community 3 computers (connected to the internet) for use at the Reserve. The finer details of how this will work, when they will be available and all the other details are being worked out as we go to print, so please keep an eye out for dates etc. Thanks again to the City of Greater Bendigo for their wonderful support for Redesdale, the provision of these computers, Wi-Fi hotspot and Stage 1 of the Redesdale Community Hub; a new kitchen!

In our recent RCC meeting we refined our focus and have overarching themes of collaboration and action. Items of focus include:

- b. Transport options
- c. Outreach services
- 3. Effective models of information sharing with community members
- 4. Rural roads safety

As we work through these focus areas I will share updates as they occur.

Council Strategies

The City of Greater Bendigo is hard at work crafting new strategies for the future of all members of our community. Two of the strategies listed below are out for community discussion, feedback and input now.

The food strategy has a broad community impact so well worth a look and the 'Reimagining of the Bendigo Creek' plan although not directly affecting our local area, anything that brings more people to the area will have a trickledown affect bringing people through Redesdale to get to Bendigo. Hopefully they stop, stay and spend at our eateries and general store.

1. Greater Bendigo's Food System Strategy 2020 – 2030 (Rebecca Huddy)

- 3. There is also work being done on a policy to better use, access and support of Community Buildings in the Shire. Keep an eye out for a draft policy in the next month or so. I have been fortunate to be involved with the early development of this policy which is hopefully put to council for ratification in the middle of this year.

One of the banksias we discussed is Banksia blechnifolia which trails across the ground and can drape itself over rocks quite attractively. Its foliage is deeply toothed which gives it a similar appearance to Blechnum fern, hence its specific name. The flowers are typical banksia cones which sit up amongst the foliage and are a source of nectar for birds and insects. Banksia petiolaris grows in the same way but its foliage is more finely toothed. A taller growing shrubby-type is Banksia caleyi with dark flower-buds that hang down earning it the common name, Red Lantern Banksia.

Banksias are in the Proteaceae family and are adapted to phosphorus-poor soils so can be "poisoned" by fertiliser unless you use one suitable for native plants.

Correas, the "Native Fuchsias", can get quite tall but respond well to pruning so can be kept at a suitable height. But several types stay low such as Correa pulchella which has flowers ranging from soft pink to bright orange. There's some lower growing forms of Correa reflexa and C. alba which are worth searching out.

One of our favourite forms of rosemary is the prostrate or trailing type called Rosmarinus officialis "Prostratus" (actually rosemary has recently been lumped in with salvia so is now Salvia rosmarinus!). It's another plant that trails and can mould itself over rocks and the edges of garden beds. The foliage is finer than the typical culinary rosemary but works just the same with the Sunday roast! The soft bluey-purple flowers are an added bonus during the winter and are alive with bees — one visitor referred to them as "the bee-bushes"! The advantage of the trailing habit is that it often puts down roots where it touches

the ground so it's a handy way of propagation; just allow the roots to develop then sever the new plant from the original and replant it where you want it. Being from the Mediterranean it prefers to be in full sun in well drained soil which isn't too rich (so avoid manures or other fertilisers). A raised bed is the ideal setting as it allows the rosemary to trail over the edges while ensuring it's not going to get water-logged during the winter.

For a slightly less exposed situation the "Hardy Plumbago", Ceratostigma griffithii, gives value in different seasons. It has beautiful, clear blue flowers through summer then develops colourful red autumn foliage and leafs out again in the freshest green come spring. Although it will flag in extreme heat it tolerates the summer fairly well.

One of the best daisies I've grown is the shrubby "Moroccan Daisy", Rhodanthemum hosmariense. Above the finely cut silvery green foliage, sparkling white flowers open up from tight buds which are edged in black. I think it's technically a sub-shrub because the flowering stems die back at the end of the summer so the bush stays very low over the winter. It's easy enough to strike from cuttings though it can be a bit slow to get established. It doesn't require a lot of water over the summer and it definitely doesn't want to be in soggy ground over winter, so another tenant for the raised bed! To finish I'll return to the Aussie natives and mention my favourite rock garden shrub, Pomaderris obcordata 'Mallee Princess'. It originates from near the Victorian/South Australian border and forms a low hummock of small green leaves which are covered in winter by terminal clusters of soft pink buds which open as white stars. We planted ours in a very sandy garden bed and when it was quite young it was attacked by a marauding cockatoo who reduced it to a much smaller mound of twigs! However it slowly recovered and after a few years it looks great. I'm not recommending you get the cockies to do this on a regular basis but at least we know that sometimes even this sort of vandalism can be overlooked,



Campaspe River Update.

Coliban Water must be held accountable for their contamination of the Campaspe River.

The latest EPA / Coliban Water court case was listed for February 3rd at the Kyneton Magistrates Court and those who gave up their time to go and were hoping for some justice and practical help for our waterways, were disappointed that it was adjourned for a second time. CW requested a further six weeks to continue their discussions with the EPA, who did not object to this request. The charges were made public November 24th 2019 and the court appearance is now to be March 16th 2020. When a private non-government individual was very swiftly charged for illegal dumping last year, Dr Pigdon stated that, "EPA and the community are sick of people treating Victoria as a dumping ground and EPA makes no apology for taking a no-tolerance approach." We would like to see an appropriate outcome swiftly brought about in this case.

The new flow meter, up river of the KWRP discharge point, has been installed. Readings will be collected and compared with those taken at the BOM station at Redesdale.

The construction of Hardwick's much needed Turkey Nest Dam has begun.

The public supported the river through the petition, and now have a chance to support independent monitoring with the results available to all, through crowd funding. https://chuffed.org/project/this-river-is-not-a-tip-saving-the-campaspe-for-its-communities Please consider. Thanks to Steph Ryan MP for her efforts with the petition.

Goulburn-Murray Water warnings via media releases put out on December 19th, told us that the water in Lake Eppalock was only fit for sightseeing due to serious Blue-Green Algae blooms. "Blue-green algae occur naturally in waterbodies. They contain toxins that are harmful to humans and animals. Characteristic signs of algae contact are skin rashes or itchiness; sore eyes, ears and nose; or if swallowed, nausea or vomiting."

GMW recommends:

People and pets avoid contact with the water.

People who come into contact with affected water should wash affected skin immediately in clean cold water.

Seeking an alternative water supply for stock and pets where possible.

Do not use affected water for cooking, drinking, washing or showering. Boiling the affected water will not make it safe for these purposes.

Reading GMW's fact sheet and other information on blue green algae at GMW's blue-green algae webpage (https://www.g-mwater.com.au/news/bga) to be informed of the risks. These warnings were due to be updated Feb 21st. Water samples taken by Parks Victoria at Turpins Falls (about 17th of Jan), "show that low levels of a single non-toxic species of Blue Green Algae is present in the water. The levels are currently within safe water quality levels for recreational waters. Parks Victoria will continue to monitor conditions at Turpins Falls as summer progresses."

Bendigo Ripped Off By Sports Grants Rort

Federal Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters is calling for immediate funding for projects dudded by Bridget McKenzie's sports grant scheme.

"The Bendigo electorate has been ripped off by this rort," Chesters said.

"Our community has potentially missed out on almost \$1 million dollars of sporting infrastructure upgrades because of a corrupt process. We deserve our fair share." After obtaining a spreadsheet created by Senator McKenzie's office, the ABC has released the list of the top 50 ranked sports grant projects that missed out on funding which includes Kyneton District Soccer Club who scored 87/100 and the City of Greater Bendigo, who applied on behalf of the Garden Gully Hockey Facility and received a score of 86/100. "Both of these projects scored high for a reason. They were ranked on community participation, community need and project design."

The Kyneton District Soccer club's project was worth \$460,000 while the Garden Gully Hockey Facility upgrade required \$500,000.

The ABC also reports that the lowest ranked application funded got the maximum grant available, and the three lowest ranked projects funded were all in Coalition-held seats. "These worthwhile clubs deserve to know why lower ranked

"These worthwhile clubs deserve to know why lower ranked projects received funding over theirs," Chesters said.

"In light of yesterday's revelations, the full list of every eligible application and how it was assessed by Sport Australia must immediately be released.

"I acknowledge and am pleased that Neangar Park Golf Club received \$250,000 in Round 3 of the Community Sports Infrastructure Grants program, but it makes me question why other highly ranked groups missed out.

"It should not be one or the other."

Clubs and councils that missed out still haven't received an apology from the Government.

They deserve, at the very least, to know if they were dudded by Bridget McKenzie and anyone else involved in this Government's shameless rorting.

"This Liberal National Government continues to leave Bendigo off the map, I'm calling for our fair share," Chesters said.

Upgrade needed at fatal intersection

Tooborac residents are calling on the Andrews Government to upgrade a local intersection following a fatal collision last month.

Local MP and The Nationals deputy leader Steph Ryan has written to the Roads Minister about the intersection after members of the Tooborac CFA attended a three-car collision at the intersection of Seymour-Tooborac Rd and the Northern Hwy, last month.

"Following last month's tragic accident, I have been contacted by a number of local residents, including by members of the Tooborac CFA who are pushing for long-term safety improvements at the intersection," Ms Ryan said.

"The intersection has become a notorious blackspot for motorists attempting to turn off the Northern Hwy into Majors Line Rd.

"One solution suggested by the community is for VicRoads to add a turning lane on the Northern Hwy into Majors Line Rd to reduce the risk of future collisions."

Ms Ryan added that she had previously raised concerns about the intersection with the Minister in June last year, following a fire at Easter which left an increased amount of timber on the roadside.

"I previously raised the safety of this intersection with the Minister last, asking her to investigate its safety and urging VicRoads to attend to fallen timber on the roadside of Majors Line Rd.

"In her response, the Minister advised that Regional Roads Victoria conducted an assessment of the investigation and found that it met the recommended standards.

"Following last month's fatal collision, I have again written to the Minister to request her urgent investigation into long-term safety improvements at the intersection.

"The local community are devastated by last month's tragic accident and fear that it's likely to happen again if immediate action is not taken to address this hazardous intersection."










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We don't need breaks

Osteoporosis is a common condition affecting over a million Australians. If you are a student of Greek language you will understand that the name is succinctly descriptive - osteoporosis sufferers have bones that are literally porous, or full of holes.

Bones are an amazingly strong intermix of collagen fibres and calcium crystals, which gives bone great resistance to all sorts of force - compression, twisting and flexing which of course gives us great ability to run, jump - and fall, and survive - in the rough and tumble of sports like AFL.

Our bones are constantly being renewed to endure the daily stresses of getting around. In this process of renewal two groups of bone cells are important. One group - osteoblasts - builds new bone. The other group - osteoclasts - breaks down old bone for renewal. So if your bones were an apartment building with "concrete cancer", the renewal process of bones looks like the "concrete cancer" gets fixed, without the need to demolish and completely rebuild, all while the residents continue to live in the building. Now that's a building insurer's dream!

Like many processes in the body, unfortunately the renewal process of bones is reduced by age. So almost everyone has less bone density at age 70 than they did at age 20. Some people have drastically, dangerously reduced bone density however.

Those at increased risk of osteoporosis include those in whom parents also had osteoporosis, those people who have inadequate diet, those who get inadequate exercise, those who have liver or kidney, thyroid or bowel disease, or anyone who has smoked or drunk alcohol to excess. In addition some medicines are associated with an increased risk of osteoporosis.

What happens if osteoporosis is left unchecked? There are literally no symptoms until bones actually break. When bones are severely weakened, fractures can happen even with minor falls, or sometimes a fracture happens spontaneously, as the bone is just too weak to resist gravity.

Potentially any bone can break because of osteoporosis, but there are two particular places in our skeleton where forces combine to give the greatest risk of fracture. These are in the lumbar spine and in the hip - or femur. That is why we most often measure bone density in these places.

Anyone who has seen a friend or relative suffer a hip fracture, or who has suffered a fracture themselves, will understand what a devastating effect it can have. It's a big operation to replace the broken hip, weeks of rehabilitation and often months of trying to get back to normal life. Recovery from a hip fracture is a slow and painful process. Sadly some people do not survive.

The good news is that because of advances in treatment, osteoporosis has never been more easily, effectively or safely treated than it is today. Treatment commonly consists of six monthly injections. The injections work by suppressing the bone cells that break down bone - the osteoclasts. With regular injections many people on treatment can expect an increase in bone density, reversing the natural decline that happens with age.

It would be remiss not to emphasise the importance of prevention however. A good diet with plenty of calcium and vitamin d, regular exercise and avoiding the usual toxins of life - alcohol and cigarette smoke - will go a long way to keeping your bones healthy, and avoiding the kind of breaks you just don't want.

Stinson Memorial Commemoration

Continued from front page

On the 31st January 1945, at the entrance to the Spring Plains farm on the Burke and Wills track, a Stinson model A aircraft fell out of the sky and all ten people on board perished. Ellis Knight, Reg Bennet (dec. grand father and father of the Bennett family of MIa Mia) and Mrs Davey, a volunteer plane watcher, all saw it happen.

The catastrophe is still in their minds and those of the deceased's families. This year, due to local efforts particularly those of Rod Chapman and Colin Smith, a memorial service on the 75th anniversary was conducted and a memorial plaque unveiled. It was a propitious occasion, wrenching, solemn and held under a threatening cloud cover. Auspicious as well as propitious.

The site is a confluence of history and chances. History insofar as it was the contact area of the Dja Dja Warrung and Taungurwong clans as they moved over millenia around central Victoria. It is in the path of the exchange of Mt William flint stones. So far as is possible to ascertain it is the exact spot where Major Mitchell and his survey expedition passed over the Campaspe in 1836/7, which he named after one of Alexander the Great generals. The expedition had ridden up out of the Mia Mia creek ravine to find harder ground over which the heavy drays could travel. It became the intersection of squatter settlers and their largely ex-convict shepherds. The first lot from the Yass plains in NSW, in this case the Pohlman and Baynton crews, moving south along the Major's line. The second lot moving north from the Port Phillip District. The Dja Dja Warrung and Taungurong were displaced with relatively little effort and a few murders on both sides. In fact both clans appear to have been decimated ten years before, by a smallpox outbreak, which were endemic to Eastern Australia after having been brought to the north coast of the continent by Marcassan sea slug gatherers some four centuries before.

It is a place of confluence for other reasons. Burke and Wills in 1861 passed along the track as they sought the Great Inland Sea. In 1910 the Duigan brothers launched their home designed and built aircraft into the air, and initiated the march of the Australian aeronautical industry. The first powered flight by such an aircraft in Australian history. Then, with massive irony and human cost the ANA Stinson fell to the ground, disintegrating as it did so, with an impact so severe that human survival was just not possible. It could be the pilot was attempting to land on the emergency airstrip on Spring Plains which largely followed the take-off point by the Duigans

At first sabotage was suspected, not entirely an absurd proposition. In January 1945 the so-called Second World War was far from won. The Germans had just been defeated at the Battle of the Bulge, the Japanese were still in Singapore and Manila. So the question is begged. What was the flight about and why travel from Melbourne to Mildura stopping at Kerang. The answer lies in the passenger list. Half of them were associated with the Allied Works Council. (AWC). This augustly named outfit was the Federal governments quartermaster authority supervising the war effort. But it had other

secret and innovative functions. It was also the research and development arm of the forces, briefed to design and construct new weapons to aid the defeat of our foes. These men were on their way from the government aircraft factory at Fisherman's Bend, to the Mildura AWC factories obviously to supervise aeronautical works. One victim was the Boeing rep attached to the RAAF. Mildura is seldom associated with intellectual endeavour but in this instance the research facilities, as was often the case were located out of air raid compass. Later the AWC establishment at Mildura was to emerge as an engineering and medical campus of Melbourne University as it had the infrastructure to sustain the many soldiers on the CERT educational program.

The catastrophe could not escape public notice. A couple of RAAF passengers a fortnight earlier, had noticed a crack line in the wing structure and had brought it to notice. They were contacted by two parliamentarians. The Lang Labor member Joseph Clark and the staunchly conservative member Thomas White DFC. He had married Alfred Deakin's daughter and flown with the AFC in Iraq. White admired by almost everybody, and Clark, perhaps less so, agitated for a Commission of Enquiry. It could not be resisted and Justice Philp of the Queensland Supreme Court was appointed Chairman. Justice Philp was later to conduct the Royal Commission into the espionage activities within Australia of the Soviet Union. The Enquiry revealed that the fault lay with the re-configuration of the plane carried out beyond its original specifications. The tri-motor system had been replaced by a more powerful and heavy bi-motor structure and this had caused the phenomenon as it then was, of metal fatigue to crack and then dismember the elevator hinge of the wing. It just fell out of the air. A lasting a valuable addition to aeronautical science was unmasked, that of metal fatigue. This catastrophe had an enduring and immensely valuable result. It alerted the scientists of the world to the danger of metal exhaustion. That alert saved countless lives.

VH-UYY STINSON MEMORIAL ACCOMPLISHED

The 31st of January 2020 at 0930 hours on the Burke & Wills Track, history was made and a terrible neglect was addressed. Preparations for the event came together as though it had been rehearsed. In the morning the weather was mild, slightly overcast and a light wind: perfect as if made to order for this occasion.

About one hundred and fifty people attended the event from various historic and aviation related organisations, local people from the district and the relatives of the victims of this aviation tragedy.

The Australian National Anthem commenced proceedings and the Australian Flag was unfurled from the top of the flag pole, followed by the United States of America flag on a second flag pole in honour of Harry Franklin Black, and the New Zealand flag from the yard arm of the second flag pole in honour of First Officer Orvil Darcy Openshaw .

Howard Nathan opened proceedings warmly welcoming the enthusiastic crowd to this historic event. Howard described the confluence of many historic occurrences from the time of indigenous clan meetings of the Dja Dja Warung and Taungurung tribes, who shared this land. The theme continued citing the explorers Major Mitchell and Burke and Wills, whose trails went through this very place. Next to be mentioned were the Overlanders from the colony of New South Wales and the Overstraiters from Tasmania who met and developed the pastoral properties here in the district.

Howard Nathan once again notes that here, this coincidence of historic milestones makes it's mark in aviation. The achievement of the Duigan brother's first flight in a locally made plane and the sad loss of VH-UYY that became the catalyst for significant advances in aviation safety worldwide.

Shire of Mitchell's Cr Bill Chisolm spoke of the historical coincidence of aviation related events in such a small locality including a World War Two emergency air strip on the opposite side of the Burke and Wills Track that made this place unique and worthy of recognition.

Warren Canning President of the Kyneton Aero Club Inc and Aviation Scientist of the Defence Science Technology Organisation told of the research work carried out by Aeronautical Research Laboratories at Fishermans Bend. The crash of VH- UYY initiated the research into air frame durability and testing for metal fatigue. Two hundred P51 Mustang wings were allocated for testing; flexing of these wing structures in repetition on a pneumatic operated test frame over thousands of cycles provided data to develop parameters of safety and endurance.

Bryan Kerr, son of Frederick Kerr and brother of Colin Kerr, two of the deceased told of how he had travelled in that same plane 6 weeks earlier and how important this event was to his family. Bryan unveiled the memorial plaque upon the cairn, and the wreaths were laid at the foot of the cairn from the relatives of the victims, Kyneton RSL World War Two veterans, and Ellis Knight laid a wreath on behalf of the community. The service concluded shortly after 10am and food and refreshments were on offer to all at the Mia Mia Hall where the relatives of the victims were able to speak with organisers, local residents and view a large model of the Stinson VH-UYY and enjoy our hospitality.

This event will be rightly remembered for many reasons. For the relatives of the victims it was recognition, knowledge and a long awaited conclusion, which has helped the healing process. Many relatives commented that they had no idea of what really happened. For our locality it was history being remembered and recorded, placed prominently for all to see. For the Stinson Memorial Committee it was a mission successfully accomplished under adverse conditions through the strength, talents, generosity and tenacity of it's members and the broader community.

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
