Time Line Of Mia Mia History

Part2.

Part 1. March 2023 Edition

GOLD AND MORE GOLD

The newly created colony of Victoria (July the first 1851) was turned upside-down by the open finding of alluvial gold at Ballarat later that year. There had been whiffs of gold previously and LaTrobe realized the turmoil that could ensue. Then as now the Americans are still working through their gold rush upheavals. The effect at Mia Mia largely due to the gold rushes at Bendigo and Heathcote was stupendous. For details read elsewhere. One local event is worth mentioning. In 1853, 70kgs of gold and \$500k (value today in AUD 6 to 7 \$million) worth of cash was transported from the McIvor fields to Kyneton for shipment to Melbourne. As the colonial government could not provide armed police escorts for all shipments, private escort companies were formed to perform that task. A local company was created in Bendigo by some undistinguished local business people to fulfill that objective.

On 23rd July 1853 the convoy left Heathcote passed through a steep gully.

It was so steep that the carrying coach could not be turned around or continue at some pace up the incline. Out of bush stepped armed and mounted robbing brigands. Unfortunately, the Police Sergeant who was on the coach found that his pistol had jammed and could not fire. The brigands galloped off with the gold, but shots had been fired so some noise was enjoyed. When I came to research the company record, not a syllable could be found about the non-registration of the company nor of the named Directors. All had attacks of the vapours and had to flee to healthier climes. The company was bogus from the outset but more was to follow. That amount of gold could not have been passed on in the local Victorian market, as it would have disturbed that market. It had to be spirited out of Melbourne. Fortunately a local ship was found which set sail shortly afterwards and was never heard or seen again. Meanwhile two local lads who did some of the shooting and got in return \$100 worth of gold dust, were properly topped, but not quartered as that might have affected the ladies. All this just out of Mia Mia CBD.

June 1860 witnessed the departure of Messrs Burke and Wills and impedimenta, from Melbourne to the Arafura Sea in order to discover the non-existent lake or rivers which "serviced" inland Australia.

On their sixth day out, together with their boats, camels, and hat boxes a call of nature befell Burke. He found it necessary to ride over to Castlemaine so as to relieve himself with his mistress who lived in that town with her parents. Having been the police sergeant, he felt she could oblige him despite being a mature woman of 16. A touch of paedophilia to commence the journey was in order, so instead of a stayover night on what is now the Mia Mia Recreation Reserve or "The flat", the entire outfit was there for three days and the less written about the nights the better. In 1868 The township of Mia Mia was declared, and land lots subdivided. The name had gone through several iterations. Miami, was one. The sub divided allotments took no regard of cliffs, flood plains, or geology. So, to this day, quarter acre house blooks litter the area. They have planning permits but not building permits, so that every twenty years some are

sold by western suburbs shonks to people who think they are buying the Oz dream but in reality, without hope of ever building on them. Even with advanced technology, town water is not a prospect and sewerage even less so.

The Mia Mia/Redesdale Bridge over the Campaspe (1867) is one too far. The curious triple arches and double platforms derive from its original purpose as a railway bridge across the Yarra at Hawthorn. It was brought to Victoria in prefab form but was too short for its intended purpose. A successful insurance episode was fought out when the ship carrying most of it sank at its wharf in Melbourne.

This caused most of its bits to deteriorate but were restorable. The two adjoining shires fought over cost and repair but need not have bothered as the cost of constructing the approach roads far exceeded that of the bridge.

RECENT EVENTS

Mia Mia set the scene for aeronautical development in Australia. The Duigan brothers of Spring Plains station, were schoolboys in 1910 when they were handed a postcard of the Wright Brothers craft taking to the air at Kitty Hawk. When on holidays they set about and succeeded in building at Mia Mia the first manned and powered aircraft in Australia. The station is still there and the aircraft in the foyer of the Melbourne Museum. Houdini did fly a couple of months earlier, but his aircraft had been imported from France.

In 1945, at almost exactly the same spot, a Stimson passenger plane fell out of sky as local farmers and wives stood around in horror. The phrase "fell out of the sky" is accurate and one used in the coronial enquiry. The plane had been modified by having its nose engine removed. The plane was enroute to Mildura where a wartime aircraft facility was engaged in research. Aboard were US naval engineers and some Australia scientists. One with his son onboard. All were killed, but it did lead to the recognition of metal fatigue as a prime factor in aircraft design and construction. One of its wings had simply fallen off due to what was then unknown.

Since then, Mia Mia staged Concert Opera seasons for eight years but Covid stopped that. The Burke and Wills Track is up for repair and reintroduction of vineyards has enlivened the scene.

With the end of daylight savings upon us again, it's time to drag out the good old " change your clock and change your smoke alarm battery " slogan. This year the CFA want to take it a step further and encourage you to purchase another smoke alarm.

Research has shown that most homes do not have enough smoke alarms, there has been occasions where the alarm is going off in the hallway but not heard from the bedrooms. For this reason the CFA is encouraging people to install a smoke alarm at least in the master bedroom. The newer versions have Lithium batteries in them which can last 10 years. These basic models can be purchased from hardware stores for around \$30 with other models that link to alarms in multiple rooms being more expensive. If anyone was in need of assistance to install a new alarm we, at the brigade, are able to help.

With an extended dry period continuing we are cautious about what to expect with the Easter holiday period approaching. We have seen reckless behaviour start fires close to home, caused by landholders wanting to clean up their properties. Mowing dry grass is our greatest concern. With a steel blade hitting rock, bearings running hot and a muffler pumping out hot fumes and embers, a mower provides multiple sources of ignition. It is best to not mow at all. If you really have to then use the conditions to your advantage. Take note of the weather forecast and choose a cool, still or even showery day. If that's not possible then at least start early and finish before the day warms up. Don't mow at 3pm.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Spaghetti alla Nerano 74



Oil for deep frying

6 to 10 zucchini, (varying sizes is fine)

500gm spaghetti

4 tablespoons olive oil

10 basil leaves torn into pieces

4 tablespoons butter

10 tablespoons grated parmesan

(or 5 parmesan and 5 pecorino)

Salt and pepper to taste

Method

Slice zucchini into small rounds (I used a mandolin)

Heat oil in deep fryer in small batches and fry till brown

(Approx. 4 to 5 minutes)

Remove from oil and drain on a paper towel

Let the zucchini cool, transfer to a bowl

Add the basil and place in fridge overnight

(or a few hours till soft)

Cook the spaghetti as per packet instructions until its 2 minutes away from being tender

Heat oil in a pan, add the zucchini cook stirring often till soft, and add a cup of spaghetti cooking water and the butter to the pan,

Transfer the spaghetti to the pan, add the cheese and toss well.

If needed add a splash more water from the spaghetti pot, add pepper and taste for salt

This delicious recipe is a great way to use zucchini and yes they must be deep fried



Plant of the Month

Old Man Saltbush

Atriplex nummularia

In this series, I am emphasising plants that are hardy and thrive in our dry granitic environment. In this regard, saltbush is a winner. It does everything you want it to do. It tolerates severe drought, is frost tolerant, can be hedged, provides nesting cover for all our beautiful little wrens, attracts bees and butterflies, provides a lovely grey contrast to greener plantings – and, most pleasingly, it is extremely easy to propagate from cuttings.

For those of you who have recently arrived here and are ready to plant a new garden, there is no need to buy this plant, just ask a local for a few sprigs. We are very willing to show you how to propagate. As you can see from the photos, it is a great hedge and ground cover.

Because of its light colour, it is sometimes planted along driveways and roadsides because its reflective leaves make it easy to see at night.

Artichokes - plant crowns, Beetroot - sow direct (SD)

Broad beans - SD. Broccoli - plant seedling (PS)

Brussels sprouts - PS, Cabbage - SD, Carrot - SD

Cauliflower- PS, Chives - SD, Coriander - SD

Endive - SD, English spinach - SD

Garlic – plant bulbs with pointy end facing up

Kale - PS, Leek - PS, Lettuce - SD

Mint – SD in a pot to avoid spread in veg patch

Onion - SD, Pak choi - SD, Parsley - SD, Peas - SD

Radish-SD, Rocket - SD

Spring Onions - PS thickly in wide drills

Still time to plant your spring bulbs.

Dead head Agapanthus

Cut asparagus ferns to the ground when they fade

Consider succession planting your veg to avoid harvest gluts

Apply liquid fertiliser every 2 weeks

Prune raspberry canes – summer fruit bearer remove only canes that bore fruit

this year.

Autumn fruiting varieties have all their canes cut to the ground.

Regional Population Ripple?

Regional Population Ripple?

The Regional Australia Institute (RAI) think tank's 2032 strategy, The Rebalance the Nation Report 2022, includes a goal of adding 500,000 extra people to the regions, many of whom would be encouraged to leave their capital city homes. This would bring the country's regional population to 11 million.

Who are the RAI?

According to the website, it is Australia's "first and only independent think tank dedicated to building robust regional economies and a better quality of life in our regional towns and cities."

Founded in 2011 with seed money from the federal government and operating from Canberra, it is apparently a "non-partisan, not-for-profit organisation that undertakes research to stimulate and activate our rural and regional communities."

Funding comes from research partnerships with Federal and State governments, national "Regions Rising' events, regional consultancy projects, membership and philanthropic funding. The RAI seeks to inform all levels of government, industry and community to ensure the best outcomes for regional Australia and hopes that by doing this it will replace myth and stereotype with facts and knowledge. The RAI aims to build bridges between city and country Australians and says on its website: "We care about the regions, because when our regions are strong, Australia is strong."

What is the RIA calling for?

- 500,000 extra people in regional Australia by 2023 to drive prosperity and productivity,
- Increase levels of high school and tertiary qualifications,
- Have rental vacancy rates above 3%,
- More childcare options in regional areas to reduce "childcare deserts".
- More young people (15 39) in regions, and
- Increase new business and innovation in regional Australia.

The project has had a mixed response from regional centres, many of whom are struggling with rental vacancy rates, staffing and infrastructure shortages. Buying a home has also become tougher, as arrivals at rural centres during the pandemic have been driving up house prices.

RAI chief, Liz Richie, has said that she understood many regions were under tremendous pressure but that it was still time to start thinking about growth. She said, "Communities won't grow unless the leaders rally around to make them grow and growth will bring workers and critical infrastructure"

The ripple effect

There is evidence that as more people from capital cities moved to regional towns during the pandemic, some longer-term residents have moved further inland. It is unclear whether locals have been priced out of the market, displaced or are moving to smaller and less populated areas for a slower life with more space. This effect has been recorded in Noosa in Queensland, Victoria's Surf Coast, and Eurobodalla and Lake Macquarie in NSW.

Regional areas that have recorded triple digit increases in net internal migration in 2022 are Port Pirie in South Australia (population 17,750), Central Goldfields in Victoria (population 13,380), Glenn Innes in NSW (population 8,900), and Gladstone in QLD (population 64,000).

This is certainly food for thought. How have our three local governments, Macedon, Mount Alexander and the City of Greater Bendigo responded to the report? We at Bridge Connection would be interested in your feedback.




