As some of you may be aware, there is still collapsed scaffolding under the Redesdale Mia Mia Bridge from the flooding last year. This has been reported to Vic Roads by several residents and has been classified by Vic Roads as a priority. Their challenge is finding another contractor with suitable equipment to safely remove the scaffolding. The biggest thanks is given to the silent heroes who include picking up rubbish on their daily walks throughout the year.

JUNE Kitchen Garden Action

Plant or sow now

Artichokes - plant crowns

Asparagus - plant crowns

Rhubarb - plant crowns

Broad beans – sow direct (SD)

Broccoli – (PS)

Cauliflower- plant seedlings (PS)

Cabbage - PS

Celtuce - PS

Coriander - SD

Endive - PS

English Spinach - PS

Garlic – SD last planting try longer staying e.g. Creole or Silver skins

Kale -PS

Lettuce - SD

Mint – SD in a pot to avoid spread in veg patch

Mustard Greens (SD)

Onion - SD

Peas – SD (soak overnight before planting out

Radish-SD

Spring Onions - PS thickly in wide drills

Thyme - PS

Turnip – (SD)

Apply sulphate of potash to your emerging Broad Beans.

Apply liquid fertiliser every 2 weeks.

Regularly check Brassicas for snails, slugs and caterpillars.

Spray your peach and nectarine trees with an antifungal spray before growth returns to prevent leaf curl and shot hole.

Spray citrus with horticultural oil to target immature summer bugs e.g. Bronze orange bug.

Rake up the last fallen leaves for your compost heap.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Turkish Bride Soup

76

There's lots of stories behind this soup but I like the one that says it is made to sustain the bride on her wedding day. That makes it a great soup to sustain us on a cold winters day.

With some modifications you can easily make it vegetarian or vegan.

Ingredients

- 2 tbs butter
- 2 tbs vegetable oil
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 1 celery stalk, very finely chopped
- 1 medium carrot, very finely chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 cup / 200g red lentils, rinsed
- 1/3 cup/ 70g fine bulgur wheat, rinsed
- 3 1/4 cup, 750 ml chicken or vegetable stock
- 1.5 litres just boiled water
- 1 teaspoon sweet paprika
- 3 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1/2 teaspoon Aleppo pepper or mild chilli flakes
- I teaspoon dried oregano
- 2 tablespoons dried mint
- 3 tablespoons olive oil, and extra Aleppo pepper and voghurt to serve
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- Serves 4

Instructions

Melt the butter with the vegetable oil in a large saucepan over a low heat. Add the onion and fry for 5 minutes, then add the celery and carrot and cook for another 10 minutes with the lid on, adding the garlic for the last minute or so. Tip in the lentils, bulgur wheat, stock and hot water, then cover and cook over a low heat for 15 minutes, stirring every so often so the soup doesn't catch.

Lastly, add the lemon juice, dried mint and cook for a final 5 minutes, taste and add salt if needed.

Notes

Serve with a drizzle of olive oil, yoghurt and Aleppo pepper to taste. Enjoy and be sustained.



BRIDGE GARDEN PATCH

Plant of the Month Salvias or Sages

One of the little garden jewels that is still flowering at the moment is Salvia. Salvias are fantastic plants for our dry climate. There are heaps of varieties, so I'll just share with you the ones that do well at our place. At the moment, the little, dense, violet to royal blue coloured varieties are flowering.

There are a number of different varieties and I think ours is salvia nemorosa. (It's 16 years since I planted it so the name is lost in the mists of time). We have little blue pockets of it all over the garden and it is probably one of the hardiest and drought tolerant plants we have.

We also have a bright red taller salvia which waves around in the wind and is in flower most of the year. (Royal Bumble).

One of my favourite salvias grows tall and willowy and is a good screening plant though it needs to be kept under control. It has pale blue flowers, appropriately named African Skies.

There are over 900 species of salvia so it is not possible to describe them here! However, it is always worth asking a neighbour for a cutting of the varieties that do well in your district. Salvias are also known as sages and rubbing their leaves between your fingers will give that pungent sage smell. Because of this pungency they are rabbit resistant, but they are very popular with butterflies.

They will grow very readily from cuttings and plants can be divided in early spring when the new growth begins. During the summer, cut back the old flower stems and they will flower again for many months. The photo is of a clump of salvia nemorosa (I think!) flowering happily at the end of May and it has been flowering since spring.

A trip to Saudi Arabia



Recently, Rod and I had the opportunity to visit Saudi Arabia as tourists. The country opened to tourism in 2019 and then was hit by the pandemic so the country doesn't have a lot of experience in this area! The country is working towards "Vision"

2030" and tourism

is one of the key pillars at the heart of the plan to help diversify the economy and reduce reliance on oil, which they believe will run out in the next 50 years.

We arrived by ship at Jeddah which is an amazing port. It is spotlessly clean and organised and there are row upon row of huge cranes constantly unloading containers.

Modern development and tourism in Saudi have lagged behind other Arab nations such as Oman and the United Arab Emirates but is fast catching up with massive building projects planned over the next 7 years.

The history of Saudi Arabia as nation state began with the emergence of the Al Saud dynasty in central Arabia in 1727 and the prehistory of Saudi Arabia shows some of the earliest traces of human activity in the world. The Islamic prophet, Muhammad, was born in Makkah (Mecca) in 571 AD, and only Muslims are allowed to visit this city which they do in their millions for the annual pilgrimage (Hajj). Many pilgrims from all over the world arrive through Jeddah (Jedda or Jeddah) which has hosted this kind of tourism for centuries as the faithful make their way to nearby Mecca. Madinah (Medina) is a city in western Saudi where the vast Al-Masjid an-Nabawi (Prophet's Mosque) is a major Islamic pilgrimage site. Its striking Green Dome rises above the tombs of the Prophet Muhammad and early Islamic leaders Abu Bakr and Umar. The Masjid al-Qiblatain (Qiblatain Mosque) is known as the site where the Prophet Muhammad received the command to change the direction of prayer to Mecca.

There is a high-speed train which travels from Mecca to Medina via Jeddah, and we were lucky enough to travel on this amazing service from Jeddah to Medina. The railway station looked like something from a futuristic movie and the gleaming, pristine train travelled at 300 km an hour. Even the train tracks were spotless!

In Medina, the women were provided with an Abaya (long dress to wear over clothes) and a head scarf. At no other time on our visit to Saudi were women required to cover their head although we were advised to dress modestly. We were shown around the grand mosque by excellent guides who were warm and welcoming. At no stage did we or the people we were travelling with feel threatened or unwelcome.

We toured old Jedda which is being extensively restored and visited some of the vast air-conditioned shopping malls which are like cities in themselves. Another highlight was snorkelling in the Red Sea where the reefs were healthy and have been remarkable resilient to warming damage. At some locations we saw how Saudis relaxed out on the water in their large motorboats, playing loud music and with girls swimming in normal western bathers.


Of course, most of Saudi is inhospitable hot sandy desert where camels roam free, but at the fertile edges, things are definitely changing, and we feel privileged to have witnessed some of the new developments which include women being allowed to uncover their heads and drive cars and hold down professional jobs. I hope you've enjoyed this little peak into a newly opening culture.

Dad by the other drivers. During this period, he also became an active member of St John Ambulance and completed 1000 hours of volunteer community work. He had been with McKenzie's for 14 years when he retired from driving buses at age 71 years.

While many people associate dad with farming, my memories of him are listening to him telling stories about his adventures, comrader and friendships he experienced while driving buses for McKenzie's. He would recall winning over difficult passengers, going the 'extra mile' to make a pleasant day for tourists, and giving an account of some skilled driving that averted many an incident or accident.

One of my favorited last memories of dad in hospital was him looking through a memory folder: he had become confused and he was looking at older images of his parents and sisters; and more recent ones of his 5 daughters, 9 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren, and Charlie his dog but it was when he came to the last image of the McKenzie Bus Depot in Healesville his face lit up with a beautiful smile and he said "I know this one - that's McKenzie's"

While McKenzie's had been a particularly happy time of his life, dad was drawn back to Mia Mia and district.

We came back to mia mia on July 18th 2001 after dad retired from bus driving. Dad helped me start up and run sheep, farming fat lambs and wool. We came back and lived in the old family farm in coombe lane. Dad set about repairing or replacing anything that was falling down. He repaired sheds, fences, replaced tanks at the house among other things. He enjoyed tinkering with engines which led to him restoring a number of tractors for graham hyslop and help a number of farmers get their tractors going again. Dad rejoined the CFA shortly after arriving and became comms officer, he helped set up the local radio sched which is still in use today. Anytime there was a major fire dad and I would work out a roster system so that there was a change over of crew every 6 hours and food out to the men every 4 hours. Everyone knew of the little yellow ute and what it stood for. Dad stayed as comms officer for 7 years before retiring just before he turned 80.

At 80 years and after a hip replacement dad decided to do something different, he went out grape picking at least helping heather and Andrew with their vintage for a block of chocolate in return. He picked until he turned 90.

I do have to thank some people for their friendship, I call them the mia mia fox shooters association' you know who you are. Dad always enjoyed going out with you guys and girls and of course shooting foxes often a fun day out. You guys looked after dad even as he got older and slower and could not always walk long distances he did enjoy your company so thankyou.

When dad was 83yrs old a fire roared thru Kilmore and dad listening to the ABC radio heard a call go out for people to

James Alfred Coombe (always referred to as Jim) Was born 18th Jan 1931. He lived in Mia Mia and attended the local school riding his bike the 4 miles each way every day. He then attended Kyneton High School until he was 14 years old and got a job at a Garage in Kyneton.

He stayed at a boarding house during the week and at weekends he would ride his bike home on the Saturday afternoon and return Sunday afternoon. However, after 6 months he returned to helping on the farm in Mia Mia in exchange for board and keep and turned his hand to catching rabbits and helping farmers with shearing and harvesting for pocket money.

At 18 his dad bought him a truck which he used to transported livestock until a couple of bad accidents forced him to give that up. He then had several jobs before taking one with McKenzie's Tourist Services and was sent to Marysville. He drove the school bus every day and had a Marysville to Melbourne service once a week.

He took a break from driving to caretake the farm while his parents travelled in Australia but after their homecoming, was invited to resume driving for McKenzie's in Melbourne for the

1956 Olympics - mainly day tours for overseas visitors to the then newly built Eildon Weir, and around Way (Narbethong to Warburton), where he held a record for the most trips - 22 days straight. It was on one of those trips he met Mum and they were married on

7th July 1957

Jim and Beth bought and ran the Redesdale Service Station for 7 years. After that they moved around Victoria mostly, dad finding work cutting wood, baling hay, and managing properties, finally coming back to Mia Mia where they leased homes while Jim built the home at Mountain View around 1970. After about 7 years they sold up and eventually leased a crop farm in Shepparton.

In 1987 Jim and Beth parted ways and Jim moved to Healesville with Annette and again drove for McKenzie's Bus services. He became the oldest driver in the company and was referred to as

come and help blaze aid rebuild fences for different people there. So dad decided to join blaze aid, he took my van (with my blessing) with a mattress and sleeping bag in the back and spent 5 weeks at Kilmore, he made many friends and he was able to put his skill at fence making to good use. He got the nickname of 'young Jim' as he was the oldest person to join blaze aid at that time. Dad even got to meet the Governor General Sir Peter Cosgrove while there.

Dad became involved with a couple of community projects. The 1st being the Mia Mia book. Dad had a lot of knowledge of the farmers and events that took place in the 1930s, 40s, 50s, and 60s at mia mia and was able to write a lot of the stories down. The 2nd project was the Stintson Memorial, again he had known the people who witnessed the accident and wanted to help with the project.

Dad also enjoyed doing family history.

With dad getting older and weaker a decision was made to give up sheep farming. I could not farm sheep on my own and dad was at risk of being injured by them. During covid 19 pandemic of 2020 dad handed in his drivers licence and was happy for me to drive him about.

On the 1st of may dad was admitted to the Kyneton hospital where hevdied on 21st May at 6.25am.

Dad loved his kids and their families in his own way, he may not have Shown alot of affection, but his eyes always lit up when they came to visit.

he was also very proud of what they had achieved in their lives
